MEETING OF COUNCIL

Held Tuesday Evening. Business Mostly Routine. Stock Ordinance Amended.

The regular session of the city council was held in the city hall Tuesday evening. Present: Mayor Britt; Councilmen Florey, Norris, McIntyre and Prim; Recorder Stansell; Attorney Hanna.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Reports of officers read and placed on file. Bills for labor, supplies, lights, etc. for month of June were presented, audited and ordered paid.

The ordinance providing for the impounding and sale of estrays was amended so as to require ten days notice of the sale of stock taken up by the pound master; the amended ordinance also requires publication of the notice of sale in one issue of the Jacksonville Post.

Exhibits for Fair

Mr. E. R. Peterson, Rural Supervisor of Jackson County, is taking the two-week course for Rural Supervisors at Monmouth. He reports the largest attendance of any Summer School in the history of the state (400). Mr. Peterson will return about July 20th via Portland and the Pacific Ocean and Coos Bay. At that time he plans to begin gathering exhibits for the Juvenile Dept. of the State Fair. He would like to have every boy and girl in the county who can get good specimens of grain to gather these for the fair. Sample bunches should be out before too ripe and kept in a cool dry shady place. There are no prizes offered for these specimens but the name of the collector and the name of the farm may be placed on them. These will all help to make a good showing for Jackson County and the community.

Forest Fire Bulletin.

(Western Forestry and Conservation Association)

Portland, Ore., July 3.—Two convictions in Washington for burning slash without permit from a fire warden, damage amounting to perhaps \$5000 to logs and logging equipment in the same state through fires in slashings, but no loss of green timber, is the Pacific northwest record of June, the first month of the 1914 forest fire season, according to bulletins received from several states by the Western Forestry & Conservation Association.

All protective agencies were placed on the alert at the close of June by the prospect of a drying interior wind, but the new forecast service especially for forest fire conditions which is supplied by the U. S. Western Bureau soon reassured them that the threatening high pressure in Western Canada had split into two areas and the danger was for a time averted. Nevertheless all patrol forces are being rapidly recruited for the season and about 2000 men will be on duty in a few days in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. About 500 patrolmen are employed in these states by the timber owners' protective associations, nearly 200 by the states and the Government jointly outside the National Forests, and the others by the Forest Service within the National Forests. The British Columbia Government also has 235 men on duty.

July hazard to be guarded against, other than from campfires, is reported to lie chiefly in slash burning to clear land and rights of way and in leaving fires thus started to smoulder in logs and stumps to break out later when the inevitable hot and windy weather arrives. Forest officers announce that state laws regarding burning without permit and precaution will be enforced rigidly and also warn summer camping parties to be extremely careful with campfires.

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INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Manufacturing Enterprises and Improvements Providing Payrolls and Promoting Development of Oregon

(Prepared by the State Bureau of Industries and Statistics.)

Salem, Ore., July 8th. During the past week petitions for twenty Initiative measures were completed, and eleven other measures are referred to the people by legislative action. Twelve measures failed to get completed petitions. Thirty-one bills will be voted upon in Nov.

Engineers have completed survey for drainage of 50,000 acres of the Long Tom basin in Lane and Benton counties.

North Powder will have a 136 foot head water supply.

Harrisburg gets a new two story brick department store.

Sandy carried \$14,000 bonds for a union high school.

Klamath Falls will have a new Presbyterian church.

The Southern Pacific Co. will start work on ballasting its main lines in western Oregon with crushed rock to be taken from Marion.

Now the State Food and Dairy Commissioner complains because there is no state law providing for the killing of rats.

Agitation at this season of the year starts looking for the biennial plague.

Fitzgerald Bros. of Troutdale are building a ferry to operate across Columbia Slough and Blue Lake.

The halibut industry on Yaquina banks started off with a catch of 30,000 pounds by the first schooner that went out.

Sutherlin has a building boom, one being a \$10,000 residence.

Oregon sash and door manufacturers had a hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission to protest against lower rates for eastern competitors.

As result of minimum wage and eight hour laws the Livesley hop yards near Salem will install two picking machines.

The State Tax commission will get up an argument for the two new amendments to the constitution doing away equal and uniform tax laws.

The Bend Water, Lt. & Power Co. will build 100,000 gallon reservoir.

Brown Lumber Co. at Cottage Grove will enlarge its logging plant.

Mercy Hospital, Eugene, begins work on a \$15,000 school for nurses.

Eugene has 52 factories and a monthly payroll of \$38,754.

There has been a big hearing on at Astoria before the Interstate Commerce Commission to get better terminal rates.

The S. P. & S. Co. will drill a thousand foot well at Flavel.

The Fremont hotel burned at Salem and will be rebuilt of brick.

Astoria will lay 28,000 feet of sewer pipe this year.

Two freak laws fell by the wayside—the Jackson amendment to tax all lands except sites for public buildings, and the Sunday Blue Law.

Bids will be taken for the pipe line from Oregon City to the south fork of the Clackamas to give that city pure water supply.

Los Angeles capitalists will develop the placer mine on Steamboat creek in the Bohemia district.

The socialist measure for a department of public works under State Labor Commissioner Hoff to employ the unemployed got on the ballot.

The Coos Bay Times will erect a two story office building.

Commissioner Daly of Portland would spend \$100,000 on a new dam across Bull Run to raise the water pressure at Portland.

The Pollock sawmill recently burned will be rebuilt at once.

Grants Pass & Crescent City Railroad is operating five miles.

Wheeler has required the water plant and will build a city hall.

Redmond seeking to locate a large Donkard colony.

Marshfield is to have a glove factory if a free site can be offered.

Amity has a building boom and every carpenter is employed.

Union and Wallawa counties fire protection association will build a complete system of telephone lines.

Woodlawn grange is fighting the eight hour law and tax exemption.

Portland municipal shop will be abandoned about August 1st.

The Oregon-Idaho Power Co. has a force of 100 men at Oxbow on the Snake river.

PORTLAND LETTER

Land Products Show Now Assured. Eumper Grain Crop. New Schools for Bandon.

Portland, Ore., July 7, (Special).—It has been definitely decided that the commercial industrial and development organizations of Oregon will hold a big Industrial and Land Products Show in Portland from Oct. 26 to Nov. 14, and the Armory, together with one or more temporary structures, has been selected as the site. Mr. Louis W. Buckley, formerly of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, has been selected to manage the big show. About 80,000 square feet of space will be utilized and this will be nearly equally divided between soil products and products of the workshop. About 12,000 square feet will be used to show municipal and educational work. It is expected that the best showing of apples and other fruit ever made in Oregon will be found at this show. The transportation companies have taken an active interest in it and practical co-operation will be rendered by the Portland Commercial Club, Portland Chamber of Commerce, The Portland Ad Club, the Retailers' Association, the Rotary Club and by the press of Portland and the state at large.

The premium list for this land show, which will be issued in about ten days, will provide for about \$20,000 in cash and special prizes. In addition to the premiums, specially engraved diplomas will be given. It is expected that the states of Utah, Idaho and Washington will send land product exhibits and otherwise participate in this great exposition. County and district exhibits are particularly desired by the management, also a complete showing of the various phases of the lumber industry of the Northwest. The managers have opened general offices at 408 Commercial Club Building.

According to the opinion of an expert, the grain crop of Wasco County will be much greater than that of a year ago. The acreage is larger than last year and, in addition, its present outlook is for a large yield per acre. He estimates the wheat crop of the county at 825,000 bushels, barley, 275,000 and oats, 600,000 bushels.

As an indication of the promised good times in Umatilla county, it is stated that the farmers in that part of the state are spending about \$50,000 for new farm machinery this year.

Within the last two weeks at least a dozen modern harvesters have been installed and the next few days will see several more put into active service in harvesting the bumper grain crop.

"The best schools money can buy," is the motto adopted by the schools Authorities of Bandon in their efforts to make their schools the best of any in Southwestern Oregon. The total cost of new school buildings and extensions will be between 25 and \$30,000.

Up to and including June 28 the Apple Growers' Association of Hood River had shipped 20 carloads of strawberries, or about six carloads less than were shipped last year. The shipment of cherries was approximately about nine cars, or 75% of last year.

WATER PERMITS

Issued by State Engineer During Second Quarter

During the quarter ending June 30, 1914, State Engineer John H. Lewis issued 147 permits to appropriate public waters. The construction cost of the proposed works is approximately \$11,200,000. The proposed ditches and pipe lines aggregate 202 miles in length and provide for the irrigation of 21,587 acres of land; the development of 1,715 horsepower and for the municipal water supply of 6 towns. Fourteen of the above permits were for the construction of reservoirs.

The following permits have been issued in Jackson County for the appropriation of water:

School District No. 59 of Prosser, for the irrigation of 1 acre including domestic supply, diverting water from Mill Creek in sec 32 T 39 S 3 E. W. B. Hamilton of Medford, for the irrigation of 1 acre, including domestic supply, diverting water from a spring in Sec 8 T 37 S R 2 W. Beaver Portland Cement Company of Gold Hill for mining and manufacturing purposes, diverting water from the Rogue River in Sec 21 T 36 S R 3 W.
