> The Topeka State Journal, a supporter of Prohibition, on July 8, 1913, published the statement that approximately

1,500,000 QUARTS OF LIQUOR

were legally shipped into the state of Kansas each year.

Kansas got no revenue--other states got the money!

Should we place Oregon near the bottom with Kansas?

Prohibitionists like to talk about Kansas. They say it has been dry for 34 years and has made a record.

Has it? Kansas Prohibition is what sent Carrie Nation on the warpath with her hatchet. It was in Topeka, Kansas, that Mrs. Nation opened her home for the wives of men who got drunk on Kansas Prohibition liquor.

Yet Prohibitionists tell us that as the capital city of dry Kansas, Topeka is a model.

Rev. Robert Gordon, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Topeka, who has been a Prohibitionist all his life, said from his pulpit: "There are 140 joints in Topeka iwhere intoxicating liquor is sold."

To prove it, he went out and bought a keg of beer, two cases of bot-tled beer, a suitcase full of whis-key, and all the gin and wine he could carry.

That is what the Prohibitionists themselves tell us about Kansas.

Dry Kansas ranks 32nd in per Government statistics show that capita bank resources.

Dry Kansas ranks 43rd in per capita savings bank deposits.

Dry Kansas has more inmates in her prisons in proportion to population than 24 other states.

Dry Kansas has a greater proportion of juvenile delinquents than 26 other states.

Dry Kansas has a greater proportion of feeble-minded than 31 other states.

Dry Kansas has a greater proportion of *komicides* annually

than 22 other states. (Figures from U. S. Census, Federal or other Official Reports)

Dry Kansas has the lowest church enrollment of the North Central States. Only 28.4 per cent of her population is enrolled as church membership. Wisconsin, a wet state in the North

Central group, has a church roll of 44.3 per cent. Dry Kansas buys great quantities of Bitters and Home Remedies. Government reports show these

nostrums contain an average of 35 to 40 per cent alcohol. Analysic of a favorite "nerve tonic" showed two grains of

opium and 75 per cent of prain al chol to each Ruid ounce. Patent medicines are always popu-

lar in dry states; above is the reason.

Do you, as a loyal Oregonian, want to see your state held up like this to the nation's scorn?

Records of County Clerks, Express Companies and Railroads in Kansas show that Kansas consumes just as much liquor under Prohibition as it did when it had legally licensed saloons. The state now gets no public revenue from this liquor. The "blind-pig" and the "boot-legger" have taken the place of the regulated saloon and ply their illicit trade in alleys and under cover of darkness.

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THE RUHAL TEACHER

Bears Heavy Burden of Civilization.

With the ne . development of rural life, there comes the demand for increased educational facilities and the impulse of universal education which is sweeping the country calls for in telligent and consecrated leadership in our rural schools. It is upon the rural teacher that one of the heaviest burdens of civilization falls, for not only must he lay the foundation of education, but he must also instill into the pupils the real love for country life, which will hold him on the farm and help to stom the townward tide.

In the city, the teacher is a cog in the vast wheel of educational machinery; in the country he is the wheel It is he who must mold the character. inspire the ideals and shape the destiny of the farm boys and girls, and a community life in its broadest and if he is fitted by nature for the taask, | biggest sence. not only will the results of his efforts be reflected in the pupils, but gradually the whole community will be leavened with a new ambition for progress.

Re can organize around the school the main interests of the boys and girls and develop the impulse for cooperation, which in time will displace the old competitive individualism and make rural social life more congenial and satisfying. The possibilities for making the rural school the social and economic center of the community are almost endless, and the faculties of the rural teacher may have full play, for it will take all his time and ingenuity if he attains the full measure of success.

Must Be Community Leader.

A noted college professor recently community life. said that three things are now re quired of a rural teacher. The first requirement is that he must be strong and the farmer is the biggest business Half of Southeast Quarter. Section Twenty-dve. enough to establish himself as a leador in the community in which he lives and labors; second, that he must have a good grasp on the organization and management of the new and scientific farm school and, third, that he must show expert ability in dealing with

If he lives up to the opportunities of ored him as a rural leader, he wil rain boys and girls distinctly for ural life, not only by giving them he rudiments of agricultural training aut by enabling them to see the atractive side of farm life, and to realze that it is a scientific business, and me of the most complex of all pro easions with opportunities as great as those of any other calling.

"School for Parents" Needed.

The duties of the rural teacher are more varied and complicated than those of the city teacher, and he some imes has to include the parents in directing his efforts for the best results. In communities where the older population is opposed to any departure of the younger generation from established customs in either social or economic life, their co-operation can often be secured by calling community meetings and instructing the parents on matters of community interest. It is related that a success ful young teacher in a remote locality had weekly meetings attended by parents of his pupils, which finally evolved into a "school for parents" in which they were taught how to live

Social Fostures Essential,

The successful rural school is the vital social and economic center of the community and the successful rural teacher is the one who realizes that the responsibility of training local leaders for the future devolves upon him. Organized play, intercommunity athletics, community festivals, lyccum and debuting clubs, Y. M. C. A.'s, with occessional neighborhood entertainments, utilizing home tal-nt, contests in cooking and various other phases of home economics, in corn and hog clubs and other agricultural activities are a few of the methods employed by the successful rural teacher in stimulating interest and enthusiasm while teaching them the fundamental principles of successful

Perpetual Motion.

A discovery which seems to be the equivalent of perpetual motion was Summons in Foreclesure of Delindescribed by Professor Whitehead at a meeting of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers. He declared that by subjecting a closed coli of lead wire to practically absolute zero temperature, and starting a flow of electricity therein by some external means, Professor Kamerlingh Onnes of Leyden. Germany, succeeded in maintaining a Defendant continuous current 'without the expenditure of energy. To obtain the extremely low temperature necessary to make the experiment a success the coil was immersed in liquid helium. The current was started in the wire by magnetic induction, the flow of electricity persisting. It is declared, for four and one-half hours after the magnetic influence was removed. It was stated that if the experiment had not been terminated when it was the current would probably have continued to flow indefinitely .- Electrical World,






