It is not difficult to stir up popular sentiment in our day by the use of such catch phrases as "special privilege" and "trusts," but we daresay the people of Oregon are not to be fooled by this "wolf in sheep's clothing" which is dangled before them in the shape of a dentistry bill.

To lower the educational standard of a profession, be it law, ministry or medicine, is a definite step backward. The march of civilization has been unmistakably toward longer professional courses, harder requirements, higher standards. Here comes a proposal [cunningly masked] to shorten the course, reduce the requirement, lower the standard--surreptitiously to cut vicious holes in the dike society has raised for its own protection. The bill will give Oregon the lowest standard for dental requirements in the world. Is that what Oregon wants? The Telegram does not think so.
