TRAGEDY IN WOODS

Game Warden Hubbard of Ashland Shot by Loris Martin, a Trapper of Elk Creek. Slayer Claims Shot was Fired in Self Defense.

Late Thursday afternoon the information was telephoned in to the office of the county sheriff that Game Warden A. S. Hubbard of Ashland had been shot and killed by a man named Martin, near Trail, and requesting the assistance of the sheriff in securing the slayer.
 Sheriff William Singler, accompanied by deputy Wilson immediately left in an auto for the scene, returning at one o'clock Friday with the accused who is now lodged in the county jail. From information gleaned at the sheriff's office the facts appear to be as follows:
 Loris Martin, a trapper and hunter who has been located in the Elk creek region for some time had been reported as having killed deer out of season and Hubbard accompanied by constable Irwin of Ashland, went out with the avowed intention of searching Martin's cabin for evidence of the violation of the game laws. It is said that in the absence of Martin, the Warden and Irwin entered the trapper's cabin and found part of a deer which had been recently killed; that Martin returning from a round of his traps encountered the two men near his cabin and demanded what they had been doing in his cabin; Hubbard slid from his horse to the ground and advanced on Martin, at the same time reaching in his coat for his gun. Martin stepped

out of the trail to avoid Hubbard and retreated about fifteen feet at the same time telling Hubbard to come no closer; Hubbard in the mean time had drawn the revolver from his pocket and was covering Martin when the latter raised his rifle and fired, the bullet taking instant effect and killing Hubbard almost instantly. The body of the unfortunate man with the gun near his hand, was still lying where it fell, when the officers left the scene yesterday morning.
 After the shooting Irwin left the scene and when some two or three hundred yards distant called to Martin asking if he wanted to give himself up to which the latter replied, "Not to you, but I am ready to give up to Sheriff Singler whenever he comes." Martin then remained with the body until relieved by some neighbors, when he went to neighbor's house and remained over night, giving himself up to the sheriff Friday morning.
 It is said that Martin has followed hunting and trapping for a livelihood for many years and was noted as an expert woodsman and a dead shot with a rifle. It is reported that he admitted freely the killing of deer out of season and stated that the carcasses were used for food for himself and for baiting his traps.
 Mr. Hubbard, the man shot, was a resident of Ashland and was aged about 35 years. It is said that he had incurred some enmity from settlers in outlying districts on account of the methods he used to secure evidence in several cases of alleged violations of the game laws.
