He grew impatient and, turning to the other side, he said, "King of Holland, try to find out whether we are to lunch today!" Metternich had never before seen an emperor send kings to the pantry to have a meal.—Baltimore Star.

Starting Forest Fires.
Engines—portable and locomotive—are bad enough. But when it comes to deliberate, willful carelessness the campers are the most criminal miscreants of them all. Hunters, hikers and automobile parties are prime offenders against the fire laws of the state. One-third of all the forest fires must be charged against these mental and moral defectives. They make a high grade moron look like a modern Solomon. They should be abated as supreme nuisances. To build a campfire and go off and leave it burning or half put out or to build it in such a way and of such size as to make it a constant source of danger while it burns—can you imagine anything that is a more infallible index of inferior mentality in the individual who builds the fire? Honesty in War.

Rank in the Cabinet.

Latterly they are sometimes named in the order of their succession to the presidency as fixed by what is called the succession law, which differs somewhat from the foregoing."
