

Comets' Tails and the Sun.
A theory to explain the tails of comets is advanced by the French physicist, M. Houlelviqne in the Revue Scientifique. It is natural to suppose, he says, that the incandescent nucleus of a comet is throwing out electrons into the extremely rarefied atmosphere that surrounds it. The observations of George Ellery Hale, the American astronomer, prove that the sun behaves like a negatively electrified body. Therefore he repels electrons, which are negatively electrified bodies. These particles so repelled would be driven to that side of the comet which is farthest from the sun, and by contact with the molecules of the gaseous and rarefied atmosphere would produce just the luminous appearance that we call a comet's tail.

Every comet's tail always extends away from the sun. Arrhenius, the Swedish astronomer, believed that the particles of the tail were repelled by the light of the sun.
