#### Insects That Carry Diseases.

Glossina morsitans is the carrying agent of the tropical disease known as nagana, while tsetse flies are the cause of sleeping sickness.

The symptoms of tick fever are borne by ticks, and a mild fever is conveyed by sand flies. Plague is due to the rat flea, which carries the parasites in the salivary glands and leaves them in the flesh of whomsoever it bites. Mediterranean fever is carried principally by the milk of infected goats. Leprosy has been attributed to bedbugs, and some are even beginning to think that measles is due to fleas.—London Opinion.
