In another column of this paper appears a statement by Mr. Enyeart regarding his prospecting work in the lower end of town. While not definitely stating that he had "struck it rich" as some people declared, the statement shows that he has faith in the outcome and will continue the work if the necessary leases can be secured. If successful in his efforts it will mean much to this place, in various ways besides the royalty paid to the owners of the land worked. As we understand it, the royalty offered is the usual percentage paid in similar cases elsewhere in mining countries, besides which, he agrees to pay all damages done to the surface of the land worked, but as the indications are that the work will be at a depth of fifty feet or more, the surface damage will be small. Mr. Enyeart has already spent considerable time and money on the project and will install the necessary machinery and proceed with the development if he can secure the right to follow the "pay streak" to its source. Gold lying in the ground is no benefit to anyone and we hope that no obstruction will be placed in the way of further development of this prospect.

Editor Putnam in the Mail Tribune Thursday, publishes and editorial regarding the cause of wars, that is well worthy of a careful reading, it is one of the best articles we have ever seen on this subject. 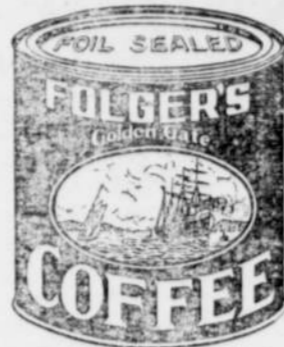

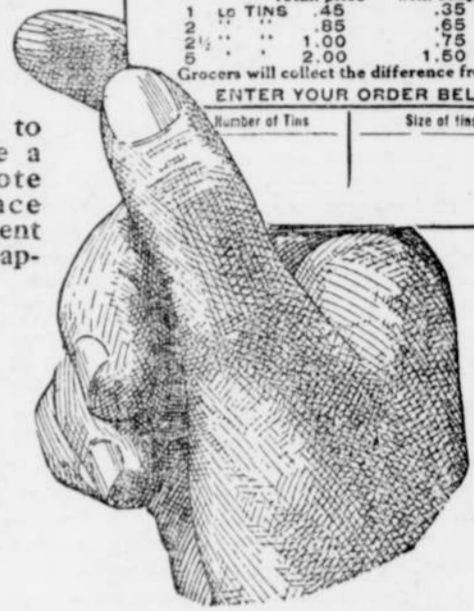
