WILSON REMITS FINE Is Lenient to Man Convicted Oregon Land Frauds--Sentence Was Reduced. Washington, Mar. 25—President Wilson today remitted the \$10,000 fine imposed on Frederick A. Hyde as part of the sentence for conviction for land frauds against the government in California and Oregon. Hyde was convicted with J. H. Schneider in a celebrated case. President Taft refused Hyde a pardon and President Wilson commuted Hyde's sentence from two years to one which he served, on condition that he pay the fine.

Pension to Woman in Norway

Salem, Ore., March 25.—When the state industrial accident commission yesterday awarded a pension to the mother of Carl Johansen, who was killed recently in Portland, it made the first pension that has been awarded by it to a foreign dependent. She lives in Norway, will receive a pension of \$7 a month, and if she lives her full expectancy will be paid approximately \$1500. Johansen was an employe of the Peninsula Industrial company. He fell off a scow and was drowned.
