Will Head Klamath Schools

DOG QUARANTINE

Jackson Comes Under Order--Dogs Unleashed or Unmuzzled May Be Shot by Officers.

Salem, Or., April 12-An order quarantining Multnomah, Clackamas, Jackson, Lake Harney, Crook, Baker, Umatilla, Wheeler, Malheur and Union counties against rabies has been issued by the state livestock sanitary board, and it purposes to rigidly enforce it.

Under the order all dogs in the counties named, save those used for patrolling livestock, must be kept muzzled, under leash, or otherwise restrained.

According to the state veterinarian the rabies situation is especially grave in Lake county. Should it happen that the order should not prove effective, it is probable, it is said, that the board may issue one making the owner of any mad dog liable for damages to stock.

PORTLAND LETTER

Chamber Sends Representative Fivers and Harbors Get Large Appropriation. Columbia River Day May 10

Portland, Ore., April 13, (Special)-The work of consolidating the commercial and civic bodies of Portland having been completed the New Chamber of Commerce is preparing to have a representative visit every city in the state where there is a commercial organization for the purpose of offering every assistance to make its work more effective. Any organization which desires the co-operation of this body in any matter pertaining to the development of its own town or its particular section of the state, is requested to immediately notify the Chamber of Commerce and we will co-operate with them in every possible way. We are preparing to send out a man, not for the purpose of securing myre members for our own organization, but to make an effort to bring about closer relations between Portland and the cities and counties of the state. The plan is being developed and date will be arranged in accordance with the demands of the cities desiring the co-operation of this organization.

From Washington comes the welcome tidings that the rivers and harbors of the Pacific Northwest have received an unexpectedly generous share of the \$30,000,000 appropriated for work of that class. The total sum set aside for this section is \$9,926,175, of which \$1,500,000 is to be devoted to completing the improvements at the mouth of the Columbia. With the Celilo Canal open to traffic and a clear deep channel across the Columbia Bar, the entire Columbia Valley is certainly in line for a long period of prosperity.

Unless present plans are materially changed, the new Portland Postoffice building to cost \$1,000,000 will be in course of construction within the next 60 days and the architect has promised that it will be completed within fourteen months. It will take the form of a big, fine office building, every part of which will be occupied by the Government, the first building of its kind in the U. S.

May 10, the anniversary of the discovery of the Columbia River by Capt. Gray, has been set aside by the management of the Panama-Pacific Exposition as "Columbia River Day." The observance of this anniversary will come as a fitting climax to the week-long celebration of the opening of the Celilo Canal.

After the formal opening of the Celilo Canal, the steamers Bailey Gatzert and Dalles City will maintain a regular service between Portland and The Dalles, while a through service to the head of navigation will be given by the steamer State of Washington, J. N. Teal, Twin Cities and Inland Empire.

WORTHLESS REMEDIES

No Real Cure Possible From Any of the Patent Preparations Investigated by Government Scientist.

Washington, April 13-After investigating under the Food and Drugs Act a large number of preparations advertised as consumption cures, the Department of Agriculture has not been able to discover any that can in any sense be regarded as "cures" for tuberculosis. Some contain drugs that may at times afford some temporary relief from the distressing symptoms of the disease, but this is all. Since the passage of federal legislation prohibiting the shipment in interstate commerce of medicinal preparations for which false and fraudulent claims are made, there has been a marked tendency to label these preparations "remedies" instead of "cures" or "infallible cures" as they used to be called. In many cases, however, they can not even be regarded as remedies.

A "cherry balsam," for example, for the "cure" of "consumption" and "hemorrhage of the lungs," which it was represented would "strike at the very root of the disease" was found on analysis to be nothing but a solution in water and alcohol of opium, sugar, benzaldehyde, inorganic salts and coloring matter. It contained no cherry bark extract or balsam.

A more elaborate "cure" consisted of five different preparations which the credulous patient was to take separately. These were first, the medicine proper, the essential ingredients of which were found to be morphine, cinchonic acid and arsenic-not a very safe mixture to take habitually; second, a tonic which was supposed to contain iron but did not; third, a "cough mixture" made up of alcohol, chloroform, and codeine which is a derivative of opium or morphine; fourth, a mixture which contained some quinine and a solution of water and alcohol; fifth, codeine tablets. Even the strongest constitution could hardly stand a prolonged course of such a treatment.

As a matter of fact the successful treatment of tuberculosis requires much more than the mere giving of medicine and, moreover, what will help one case won't help another. Claims that are absolutely unwarranted are no longer permitted on the labels of medicines shipped in interstate commerce but the wording may be such as to convey a misleading impression without the use of absolute statements. Thus these preparations continue to find a sale despite the fact that a little trouble on the part of the prospective purchaser will reveal their worthlessness.

LARGE SALE OF TIMBER

In National Forest. State will Receive Almost Half a Million Dollars

The district forester at Portland, Oregon, announced today that the Pelican Bay Lumber Co. of Klamath Falls Oregon were the successful bidders on the sale of the largest body of government timber ever advertised by the Forest Service in Washington or Oregon.

The sale includes two units, one of 85 million feet of yellow pine and other species on the west side of Klamath Lake, and a second unit of about 200 million feet of nearly pure yellow pine located just east of Crater Lake National Park. The prices on unit I are \$3.00 per M. for pine and 50 cents per M. for other species; and the prices on unit II are \$3.37 1/2 per M. for pine and 51 cents per M. for other species. The removal of the Douglas fir and white fir is optional with the purchaser. A cutting period of twelve years will be allowed for the removal of the timber. The total value of the timber is reckoned at \$1,250,000, of which the State of Oregon will receive \$437,500, as its share for the benefit of schools and roads.

The Pelican Bay Lumber Co. has been cutting National Forest timber for about four years. The Company's mill was burned last summer, but has been rebuilt and enlarged and is ready for immediate operation.

We Should Prepare

When the present war in Europe is over many penalties will have to be paid. We cannot see why all the boys in our schools above fifteen years of age are not being daily trained for what may be in store for our country.

Ancient Greece never reached perfection in the arts and in architecture, until through her daily military training as soldiers they reached nearer physical and mental perfection than any race since has.

That splendid lesson is one that should be constantly studied in our republic.

As it is we seem to be merely trusting to fate to keep us at peace, and which if persisted in, will cause our country to lose a full hundred thousand brave men before the country's armies will have learned how to fight. -Goodwin's Weekly

New States For Old

Petitions are out in Washington, California, Idaho and Texas to divide the commonwealths and to create three new sovereign states. In Washington it is proposed to take the twenty counties lying in the Columbia basin east of the Cascades, add to them the narrow northern end of Idaho and form the new state of Lincoln. In California the promoters of the enterprise advocate the deletion of the southern third allowing it to shift for itself, and the Texas senate has looked with favor upon a project to allow the Texas panhandle to start a menage of its own.

Both in Washington and in California the late prohibition fight is at the bottom of the state-division movement. Eastern Washington and southern California are the citadels of the prohibition propaganda in the two states, and in either instance the agitation springs from the district in which the "wet" sentiment prevails. Seattle and Tacoma had prohibition forced on them by the rural vote of eastern Washington; San Francisco fears that the overwhelmingly dry vote around Los Angeles will sooner or later rob it of the brimming cup.-From April Sunset
