Murdered and Robbed Tacoma, Wash., June 21—John Rainey, age 30, employed by the Wilkeson Mine Company, was shot and killed in his home at Wilkeson, 25 miles east of here, late Saturday night. Robbery is supposed to have been the motive. He was shot through the head from behind. Oregon Leads States in Amount of Wealth. Figures published in the Pacific Banker show that Oregon leads all states west of Colorado, except California and Washington, in amount of wealth. The total of Oregon's property of all kinds is valued at \$1,944,354,463 and of the United States \$187,739,071,090. In order that a channel not less than sixteen feet in depth may be established between Tillamook Bay and the docks at Bay City, the Government has ordered the dredge Oregon to Tillamook Bay and the work will be pushed vigorously until completed. It is expected that the dredge will be employed in that vicinity the balance of this season and all of next. Thirty-six thousand acres of land in Pine Valley, Baker County, will probably be thrown open for entry within a few weeks if present plans are carried out.
