Mexico City Battle Rages

Washington, June 28—Further confirmation of the defeat of the Carranza army advancing on Mexico City, brought to Vera Cruz by an American from the capital, was received today by the state department.

The state department's advices said General Carranza was rushing troop trains from Vera Cruz to the capital; that fighting, at the hour the courier started, still was going on in the outskirts of Mexico City, and that a repetition of the "tragic 10 days" which preceded the overthrow of Madero, with probably added horrors, was feared.

Included in the state department's dispatch from Vera Cruz was this: "Zapata forces defeated Carranza forces in Mexico City. Capital entirely cut off from the world; Carranza rushing all available men to Mexico City. No food in Mexico City."

PORTLAND LETTER

Will Investigate Land Grant
Case. Oregon Milk
Wins Prizes at
Fair.

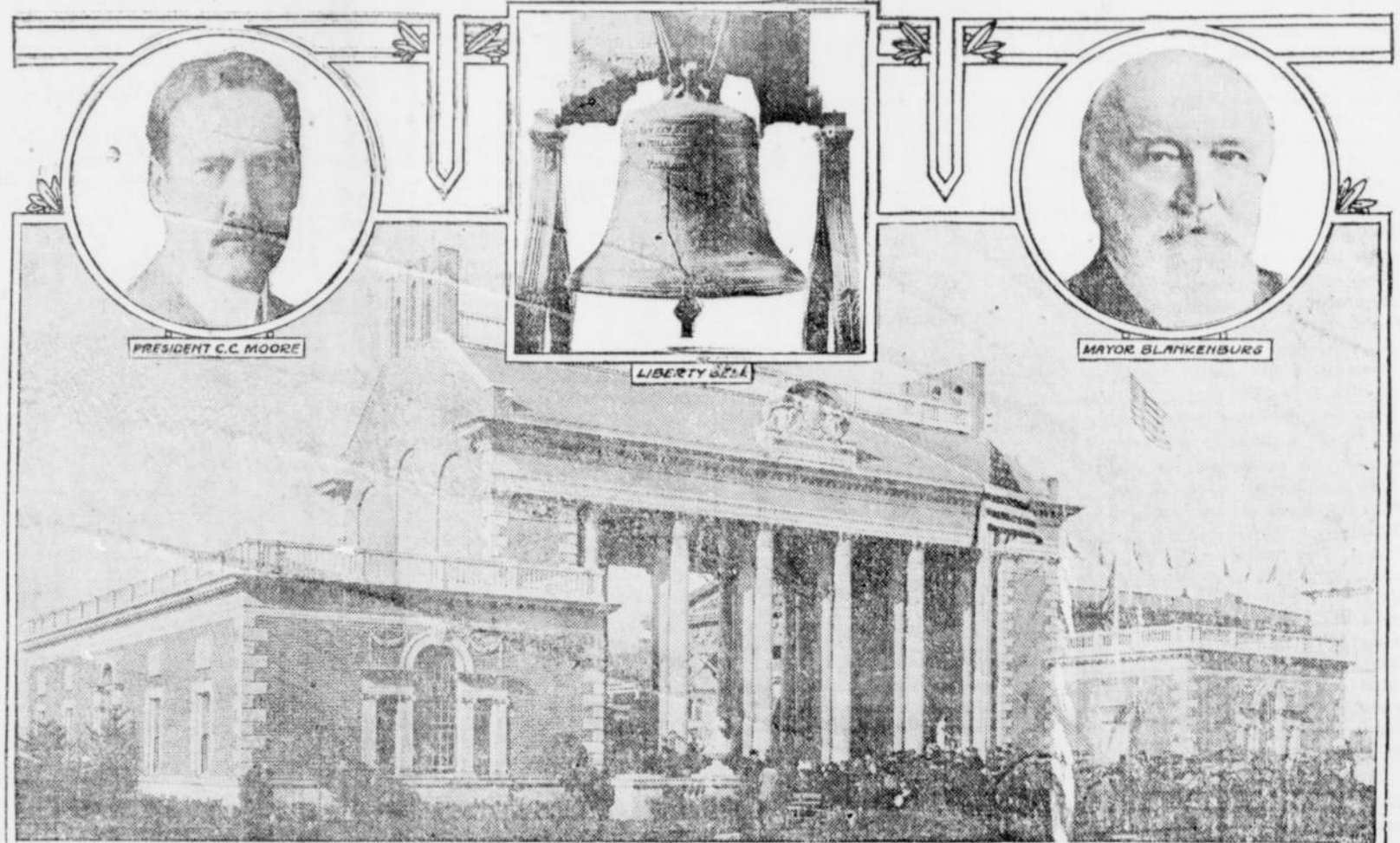
Portland, Ore., June 29, (Special)—In view of the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court in the Oregon & California land grant case, the matter has become one for action by the citizens of this state. Some decision must be arrived at by Congress within six months from the date of the Supreme Court decision, and five months of that time will elapse before the beginning of the next session of Congress leaving only one month in which to have the question acted upon by both houses. In order to expedite matters and to secure all necessary data, Oregon's congressional delegation, consisting of two senators and three representatives, will co-operate with the Portland Chamber of Commerce and a series of conference will be held to determine the standing of settlers and other interested parties in each county in which the disputed land is located. It is believed that by taking vigorous action during the Summer and Fall all facts and figures can be collected and tabulated in such form that Congress will be able to reach a decision without delay. As on this decision depends the winning or losing by Oregon of several million dollars, it is of the utmost importance that no time be lost in starting this investigation.

For the purpose of handling poultry products to the best advantage, a "Poultry and Egg Circle" has been organized at Corvallis under the direction of experts of the Agricultural College. The new association has already made arrangements to handle the products of flocks aggregating more than 3,000 fowls. The eggs will be graded, candled and marked with the association stamp. A market has already been established which will represent a marked increase in returns from this source. If found to work satisfactorily, it is proposed to organize similar circles all over the state.

That Oregon dairies rank among the very best in the United States is indicated by the action of the judges at Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco in awarding the grand prize, consisting of a gold medal and \$100 in gold, for the highest average scored by ten samples of Oregon milk exhibited. Medals were also awarded for the extremely low bacteria count in samples of Oregon milk and cream, no other samples having made anywhere near as good a showing.

Blue Ledge Mine May Ship Ore by Auto Truck.

A telegram has just been received from F. W. Carnahan, superintendent of the Blue Ledge mine, now in New York City, requesting the Commercial club to ascertain the cost of transporting ore from the Blue Ledge to Medford by auto trucks, and the possibility of road repairing, and to wire reply.

A committee composed of J. D. Bell, Geo. Putnam and H. A. Latta will at once confer with the county court and Supervisor Joe Smith, go over the road and ascertain the amount of work necessary to make an auto truck road serviceable and secure bids from truck owners.

A good all-year-round auto road to the Blue Ledge country, the steady transportation of ore, a sugar beet factory and irrigation for the valley will scatter the gloom that has become chronic with many. —Mail Tribune

ELECTRIC ROAD COMING

Barnum Road Transferred to
Southern Oregon Traction
Co. New Owners Will
Electrify And Im-
prove.

The reports mentioned in our last issue concerning the reputed sale of the Rogue River Valley railroad owned by W. S. Barnum, are proved to have been founded on fact, the papers have been signed and recorded and it is likely that the consideration price has been paid.

Two principal instruments, covering the transfer have been placed on record in the office of the County Recorder, the first being in the nature of a deed, from the Rogue River Valley Railroad Co. conveying the road with its franchises, equipment, etc. to W. S. Barnum, consideration \$1.00 and the second instrument was a deed from W. S. Barnum and wife, conveying the same property to the Southern Oregon Traction Co., the consideration mentioned in this second conveyance is \$50,000. The purchaser is the owner of the electric street railway at Medford and is commonly spoken of as "The Bullis Interests."

It is reported that the new concern will immediately proceed to electrify the road and make a number of other improvements and changes in the line and service. An extension of the road to the Applegate is spoken of as one of the probable results of the transfer. For the present the road will be operated as formerly, meanwhile plans for the proposed improvements are under way.

Supreme Court Upholds Case

The United States upholds the validity of the Oregon and California land grant and reverses Judge Wolverton who decreed its cancellation.

The Oregon counties that have lost nearly a million dollars in taxes in the past two years may now get some of their revenues back.

Politicians and land sharps who have been profiting by the agitation against the O. & C. land grant will now have to go to work on new lines politically.

All well-informed lawyers know the land grant could not be taken away from the railroad, although the railroad managers were guilty of censurable practices.

Still all that was ever done by the holding corporation has been done under acts of congress, court decisions and rulings of the land department.

The 2,300,000 acres involved are left to be disposed of by the railroad company, subject to future congressional regulations.

HUERTA UNDER ARREST

Former Mexican Ruler and His
Lieutenant Nabbed at
El Paso

Washington, June 28—Inside details of the plot to restore a Huerta regime to Mexico, nipped by the United States began trickling out today through the net of official secrecy, while General Huerta and his chief lieutenant, Pascual Orozco, are under federal detention at El Paso.

Other Mexicans, nearly a score of whom had a part in the plot that failed and probably some Americans, are under surveillance by the department of justice. Secretary Lansing conferred today with Assistant Attorney General Warren, and it became apparent that the department of justice intends to sift the case to find the backers of the new revolution. Where the trail might lead in the United States is only a matter of conjecture. All officials were silent on this feature. It is generally believed by those in close touch with Mexican affairs that the coup was to have the financial support of some well known American interests.

El Paso, Texas, June 28—General Victoriano Huerta, former president of Mexico, who with other prominent factors in the Mexican turmoil are under surveillance by agents of the United States department of justice, arose early today after a refreshing night's sleep. In a conference granted newspaper representatives, Huerta declined further to discuss the events of yesterday which led to his detention on charges of implication in a plot to set afoot a new Mexican revolution. He stood upon his declaration of last night that he would not enter Mexico at the head of an armed force. Leaders here of the Villa and Carranza factions were silent on recent developments.
