**Wood For Fuel Must**

Be Sold By Cord.

Salem, Or., July 28.—In Oregon laws have been issued by Deputy State Sealer of Weights and Measures Buchel to all district sealers that all mill wood, block, wood, ties and sawed cordwood, when sold as fuel, is firewood within the meaning of the weights and measure laws, and must be sold by the cord or fraction thereof. Coal and ice must be sold by weight he says. Further he orders that in all sales of firewood, coal and ice the purchaser must be furnished with a definite statement as to the quantity furnished. This statement may be either oral or written, he says, and is intended to give the public a means of determining if correct measurement is being delivered and to establish a basis for comparison of prices as between the different kinds and grades sold.

**516 Prisoners At Work In State Penitentiary**

Salem, Or., July 27.—For the first time since abolition of the penitentiary its whole population of physically able convicts is furnished with employment. In all there are 520 prisoners, and all, save four, who are physically incapacitated, are working. Approximately 200 are engaged in pulling flax, and it is estimated that the harvest will be complete in 10 days. The remainder are at work crushing rock for road improvement work for the institutions, and in constructing a cement flax plant, to be installed in the prison. All, save a few prisoners enjoying the positions of trustees, are under guard.

**Crack of a Bullet.**  
 That bullets neither whine, hiss, howl, hum nor whisper, novelists to the contrary notwithstanding, is information given by Edward C. Crossman in *Outing*. With one possible exception—when in certain conditions of open country modern military bullets hiss to those standing back of the firing line—nothing is audible except a sharp crash of air closing around the bullet's base when it travels at high speed. At a velocity of 1,500 feet a second, or more, the noise is "like nothing so much as a long and very violently cracked blacksnake whip." Those who stand far enough from the rifle hear the bullet's crack and later the dull, thudding noise of the rifle itself, which has been outsped. Jack London makes a soldier hit at 600 yard range first hear the sound of the modern rifle and then feel the blow of the bullet. But the bullet would have killed him half a second before the sound from the rifle reached him.

**Bacon on Sea Power.**  
 It was Francis Bacon, after the ships of England had destroyed "the invincible armada," who in a chapter entitled "Of the True Greatness of Kingdoms and Estates," proclaimed his idea that sea power is world power. He said:

"We see the great Effects of Battles by Sea. The Battle of Actium decided the Empire of the World. The Battle of Lepanto arrested the Greatness of the Turks. There be many Examples, where Sea-Fights have been Final to the Wars; But this is, when Princes or States, have set up their Rest, upon the Battalies. But thus much is certain: That hee who Commands the Sea, is at great Liberty, and may take as much, and as little of the Wars, as he will. Whereas those, that be strongest by land, are many times nevertheless in great Straights."

**Why is the Sky Blue?**  
 When a piece of iron is slowly heated in a flame it at first radiates heat, and as the frequency of the wave motions becomes greater it radiates light—first red rays, then yellow and finally, if the heat is very intense, a white light is emitted. The red rays are longer and of less frequency than the blue. When white light is passed through a prism the waves are acted upon and are separated. The red rays are diverted less from their previous direction than the violet. This is exemplified by light from a clear sky. Reflected by suspended particles in the air, the blue rays are diverted more than the others and give a blue appearance to the otherwise colorless clear sky.—Samuel S. Sadtler, S. B., in "Chemistry of Familiar Things."
