BEEF FACTORY GOES TO GRANTS PASS
Says Medford Sun. Adjunct to Land and Water Promotion Scheme
Though no official announcement has been made to the effect it is generally conceded that the sugar beet factory of the Utah-Oregon company will be located at Grants Pass, the belief being based upon a statement accredited to George Sanders in the lobby of the Hotel Josephine at Grants Pass a day or so ago. The statement was made in the presence of Alex Nibley, in charge of the beet acreage campaign in this city and no denial was made. Mr. Nibley stated Thursday that the location was up to the officials in Salt Lake City. The factory will be used in conjunction with the irrigation and land promotion schemes of the Rogue River Public Service corporation, of which George E. Sanders is president. It now develops that the beet sugar company never entertained seriously the thought of establishing the factory in this city, despite the repeated assertion that it would be located in the center of the greatest acreage. Grants Pass signed about 1100 acres, Medford 2200. Local backers began to fight shy of the proposition when Mr. Sanders issued a statement in the Portland Telegram that the factory would be located at Grant Pass. Their suspicions were well grounded as later developments prove.—Sun

HUGE REFUSE BURNER FOR HOQUIAM MILL
40 Carloads of Brick and Clay Ordered From Chelalis Factory This Week.
Chelalis, Wash., Dec. 15.—The Chelalis Brick & Tile company, of this city, this week secured an order from the Greys Harbor Lumber company, of Hoquiam, for 420,000 brick and 130 tons of clay, to be used in building a refuse burner for the Hoquiam concern's mill. The burner is to be 65 feet in diameter and 90 feet high, the largest on the Pacific coast. This will be approximately 40 car loads of material and will keep the plant running on this order alone for about two months.
