Claims \$5000 Damages For Fall on Sidewalk. Chehalis, Wash., Dec. 28—At the meeting of the city commission yesterday afternoon, Thomas J. Hunt, of Centralia, presented a claim against the city for \$5000, alleged personal injuries received when he said he fell on a wet and slippery sidewalk in this city, on November 24, on Pacific and Chehalis avenues. He alleges in his claim that he fell and broke his right arm and injured his ribs and wrist. The claim was referred to the city attorney. Fine Dairy Farm Sold By Man Who Cleared it Chehalis, Wash., Dec. 29—An 80-acre farm on rural route 1, near Chehalis, belonging to George Tane, was sold this week to Kristen Kristanson, of California, for \$16,000. The new owner will take charge immediately and will engage extensively in the dairy business. About 12 years ago, Mr. Tane purchased 145 acres for \$9500, practically all of the place being covered with timber at the time. The land was cleared and since that time Mr. Tane has sold off portions of the original 145 acres. The last 80 acres was sold this week and Mr. Tane received \$37,000 for the entire 145 acres, or a net gain of \$17,500 on Mr. Tane's investment aside from the profits of the farm while operating the place. Woodburn Sues to Keep Down Telephone Rates.
