



PRAIRIE STATES BUY HORSES IN KLAMATH.

Animals Sold for War Service in Europe Replaced by Western Farmers.

Klamath Falls, Or., Feb. 7.—Middle Western states, where all available horses were sold to European buyers early in the war, are now looking to this section for teams necessary for their farm operations. Several buyers are here from Denver, Omaha, Grand Island and other points, and seeking all types of horses.

Several cars of horses were shipped last week to Grand Island, Neb., and more will be shipped next week. A Denver concern shipped six carloads Monday, and plans other shipments at an early date. This concern's buyers are seeking any type of sound horse, as they find a market among the farmers of the Middle West for the horses that are not quite up to military requirements.

At an early date, buyers for the Italian government are expected here, seeking cavalry mounts. Practically all of the horses sent from Klamath county for military purposes thus far have been for artillery use, as the Klamath range is said to be the ideal type for hauling big guns.

Wilson's Renomination is Considered Certain.

St. Louis, Feb. 9.—That President Wilson will be renominated without opposition is the opinion of members of the subcommittee of the Democratic national committee who met here to arrange for the Democratic national convention on June 7. The committee were not so certain, however, that Vice-President Marshall would be renominated. Chairman McCombs said to newspapermen that President Wilson would be renominated and that no opposition to him had developed in any quarter.

Seattle, Feb. 8.—The soft drink store of Charles Berryman and Peter Jensen formerly a noted saloon, was entered by the police last night, and after a quantity of liquor had been found all goods and equipment were removed and the proprietors arrested.

TRAIN SHEDS COLLAPSE UNDER WEIGHT OF SNOW.

No One Hurt at North Bank Station—Union Depot Glass Falls.

Damage by storm to railroad property was not confined to blocked tracks and broken telegraph lines. At the North Bank station's passenger station in this city 20 feet of unbroken snow collapsed Saturday night under the weight of accumulated snow. The only persons injured were Mrs. T. W. Helm and her little son, who had just arrived from Hillyard, Wash., and were walking from a train. They were soon rescued without receiving serious injuries.

Yesterday's thaw caused masses of snow to slide from the roof of the Union passenger station onto the glass-covered section of the main waiting room, but by routing passengers through the baggage room, no one was struck by the falling debris.

Swedish Socialist to Make Move For Peace.

London, Feb. 7.—Notice of an interpellation on the subject of peace has been given by Deputias Tindhagen and Strom, Socialist members of the Swedish parliament, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Charlottenlund Denmark. The inquiry is whether through the initiative of Sweden or another Scandinavian country there can be arranged a peace conference of neutral states with a view to preparing the way for universal peace. It is said the interpellation is to be presented at the request of members of the Ford peace party.

Aged Elk Passes Away

Centralia, Wash., Feb. 8.—L. F. Richolt, a resident of Centralia for the past 27 years, died Sunday following a long illness. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon. The local lodge of Elks, of which Mr. Richolt was a charter member, will have charge of the services at the graveside. Mr. Richolt was 82 years old. He is survived by his wife and four children: Henry W. Richolt of Bismarck, N. D.; Frank A. Richolt of Helena, Mont.; Mrs. C. R. Andrews of Defiance, Ohio; and Miss May Richolt of this city.

VIOLATORS OF DRY LAW FINED AT ST. HELENS.

One Clatskanie Man Pays \$100 for Giving Intoxicants to Girl.

St. Helens, Or., Feb. 7.—During the past week two violations of the prohibition law were tried in the justice court here. A man charged with giving intoxicating liquor to a girl admitted his guilt and was fined \$100 and costs. The second case of a young man at Goble charged with maintaining a nuisance resulted in a plea of guilty and a fine of \$50. The sheriff poured into the Columbia river about 19 gallons of whiskey and wines confiscated in the raid.

Million and Half Prisoners

Berlin, Feb. 8, by wireless to Sayville.—"A total of 1,473,171 enemy soldiers to date are prisoners of war in Germany," the Overseas News Agency announces.

"This is not inclusive of prisoners made by German troops and left in Austria Hungary in order to shorten the transportation. In addition, 17,700 cannon, 7700 military carriages and 3300 machine guns have been conveyed to Germany. The number of rifles taken which are still fit for use is 1,330,000."

Ruling Made for Berry Shippers

Washington, D. C., Feb. 7.—Representative Sinnott has been advised by the secretary of agriculture that in shipping berries in small open containers is not required to be stated on each container, but if the berries in such containers are packed in crates the crates should be marked, giving the number of containers and the quantity of contents in each container.

LAND GRANTS

Circular Letter Relative to Some Recent Happenings in Various Parts of Oregon.

This office is daily in receipt of a number of inquiries relative to the Oregon & California grant lands, asking information as to the status of these lands, their location, character, when they may be entered or purchased, etc.

This circular is intended to reply to these letters of inquiry and to give out such information relative to these lands as may now be stated.

A list of these lands by Township and Range has been prepared for each of the several counties within the Roseburg Land District, containing these facts. These lists are intended to give merely an approximate area of such lands in each Township, based on the list of lands given in the decrees of the Federal Court.

This list for any county or counties will be furnished on request.

This office has no map for distribution, nor does it prepare blue prints, but will furnish township plats showing location of all vacant land and unsold railroad land, at \$1.00 per township. In ordering township plats both the Range and Township number must be given, and remittance should be made by certified check or U. S. Postal Money Order payable to R. R. Turner, Receiver. Personal check may not be received in payment.

Based on the list of lands given in the decrees of the Court, the approximate acreage of unsold railroad lands in the several counties of this district, at the time the suit was instituted was as follows:

Lincoln, 1010; Benton, 2776; Linn, 14320; Lane, 30,110; Douglas, 697,330; Coos, 103,620; Curry, 8400; Josephine, 172,460; Jackson, 414,530; Klamath, 13,440. Total, 1,599,326.

In addition to the above lands there are other railroad lands in several of the counties named, that at the time the suit was instituted were unsurveyed, and hence not included in the list given in the suit, but coming as well under the decrees. The approximate areas of such lands are as follows: Coos 159,900; Douglas, 659,900; Josephine, 17,000; Curry, 15,000; Jackson, 2000.

There is still a certain amount of unsurveyed railroad lands in several of the counties, namely: Curry, Douglas and Josephine. These lands when surveyed will come under whatever plan of disposition Congress may provide.

In the Civil War he was a member of Company E, Sixth Michigan heavy artillery. He is survived by a brother in California, a son and step-daughter here, and another step-daughter in Tillamook.

Cackamas Rises Fast

Oregon City, Or., Feb. 7.—The Cackamas river is higher than it has been for years according to official records here, and the lower river has raised three feet in the last 12 hours. It is impossible to anticipate what damage, if any, will be caused by the sudden rise. The prevailing temperature down the valley is 50 degrees and little rain is falling. The upper river at Willamette Falls has come up only nine-tenths of a foot in the last twelve hours.

Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—The Chehalum Lumber company of Chicago, has filed with Corporation Commissioner Schelderman its declaration of intention to engage in business in this state. Its capital is \$500,000, and N. D. Simons, of Portland, has been named as its attorney in fact.

Articles of incorporation have been filed by the Home Baking company, of Astoria, with a capital of \$5000. The Donald Lumber company, of Portland, has dissolved.

Liquor Seized in Pendleton.

Pendleton, Or., Feb. 8.—In the first liquor raid here Saturday night Sheriff Taylor and his squad arrested three women and two men, and seized 10 barrels of beer, about 70 quarts of whisky and several quarts of wine. The places raided were rooming houses. The persons arrested were released on \$50 bail each pending a hearing this afternoon before a justice of the peace.

Gold Beach Will Hold Election

Gold Beach, Or., Feb. 8.—On February 19 Gold Beach, said to be the only county seat in the United States not an incorporated city or town, is to vote on the question of incorporating, and this old-time mining and fishing town is threatened with the invasion of the boom microbes which is slowly but surely insinuating Curry county, perhaps the most isolated section of the United States.
