Larger Navy Measures Placed Before the Senate.

Washington, Feb. 8.—The house measures to strengthen the navy went over to the senate today. One is a bill to provide for adding about 330 midshipmen to the entrance class of Annapolis next July and the other calls for equipping of the navy yards at New York and Mare Island for the construction of battleships numbers 43 and 44.

Speaker Champ Clark took the lead in urging passage of the two measures in the house. He was strongly supported by Representative Mann, the minority leader, with the result that party lines were obliterated and both measures passed the house without a dissenting vote.

Must Take Big Part in War.

Paris, Feb. 8.—In explanation of Premier Briand's visit to Italy, the *Matin* says that the prolongation of the war led to certain difficulties for the Italian government which however, realizes that if Italy is to profit by the victory of the allies she must take an active part in the operations.

"This will add to Italy's burden," says the *Matin*, "but will also increase the advantage which she is to reap. M. Briand's reputation as a longheaded statesman is well established in Rome. It was he who saw that the best way to protect Egypt was to stay at Saloniki and the salvage of the Serbian army was due to his steadfastness. His visit to Italy will go far toward bringing about that absolute political and military unity of the allies, which is a condition of victory."

30 Days in Jail for Giving Liquor to Minor.

Newport, Or., Feb. 9.—In the circuit court yesterday H. Davidson pleaded guilty to the charge of giving liquor to a minor and was sentenced to 30 days' imprisonment. Indictments were also returned by the grand jury against Albert Taylor, M. H. Abbey, Roy Baynard and Otto Hofgate of Newport, charging violation of the prohibition law.

One-Man, One-Door Cars Opposed by Labor Men.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 7.—One-man streetcars which have recently been introduced on several of the runs of the Washington Water Power company and the Traction company have drawn a protest from the Central Labor council in the form of a resolution to carry the matter to the state public service commission. It is the claim of the labor body that the one-man cars are not safe, as the motorman-conductor cannot take care of the welfare of the passengers adequately. Stress is laid on the point that the passengers would experience difficulty in escaping from the one-man, one door cars in case of accident.

Cleaning Aluminum

Aluminum cooking utensils can be cleaned by filling with water containing a little vinegar and boiling five minutes or more. Utensils should then be washed thoroughly and dried. The addition of one-half teaspoonful of vinegar to the contents of an aluminum vessel will prevent the darkening due to the action of alkali. Paint and stains may be removed with turpentine. The vessel is then polished outside with whiting, ammonia or alcohol. Cleaning directions for other household material may be found in the O. A. C. bulletin *Methods of Cleaning*, copies of which may be had on request.

Laundry Marks in Europe.

Laundry marks vary greatly in Europe. Those used in Britain consist of certain small letters or figures stitched in red thread. Not all continental laundries are so considerate. In some parts of France linen is defaced by having the whole name and address of the laundry stamped upon it and an additional geometrical design to indicate the owner.

In Bavaria every piece has a number stamped on in large characters. In other parts of Germany a small cotton label is attached by means of a waterproof (hot) adhesive. In Bulgaria each laundry has a large number of stamps engraved with designs, and in Russia the laundries mark linen with threads worked in arrow shapes.

In some Russian towns the police periodically issue regulations for laundries, while in Odessa books of marks are furnished annually to the laundry proprietors, and these marks and no others may be used. By this system criminals and revolutionary agitators are often traced.—*London Mail.*

The Bulldog.

The bulldog, unlike the majority of dogs, very seldom barks. In fact, owing to the construction of his throat his attempts at barking are more like a burlesque of the real thing. He wades into a fight without any vocal warning, and the only sound he emits is his heavy breathing. His courage is astonishing, and the largeness of his opponent never acts as a deterrent when hostilities are imminent. Still, as he is not a quarrelsome dog, he very rarely indulges in street brawls, and as he is exceedingly good natured, it takes a lot to rouse him.

The modern bulldog is undoubtedly a different looking animal from his bullfighting ancestors. The most conspicuous "improvements" introduced by the present day "fancy" are largeness of head, width of chest, heaviness of bone and more typical tail.

What the Peruvians Believed.

Antiquity of Soap.

In spite of the antiquity of soap, as evidenced by a soap shop still to be seen in the ruins of Pompeii, the chemistry of soapmaking was not understood by us until about a century ago. Since then soap and armaments have become intimately associated with each other. For a long time soap-makers made no profit out of their "lyes." Now they extract from these byproducts glycerin, which, besides being a drug, food and "toilet requisite," enters into the manufacture of nitroglycerin and is the basis of dynamite and other high explosives.—*London Spectator.*

Mucilage to Stick on Tin.

Whoever has tried to stick a paper label on a piece of tin knows how difficult it is. Here, however, is a recipe for a mucilage especially designed for this purpose and published by Nature: In 150 cubic centimeters of boiling water dissolve twenty grams of gum tragacanth and add a paste made of sixty grams of flour and ten grams of dextrine dissolved in forty cubic centimeters of water. Dilute the whole with 200 cubic centimeters of boiling water and add ten grams of glycerin and ten grams of salicylic acid. Boil for five minutes, stirring constantly.

Cutting Up Old Furs.

There is a knack of cutting up old furs with which all women are not familiar. The pelt should be turned wrong side up and the skin slowly and carefully cut with a sharp penknife, the blade penetrating the skin only and not touching the long hairs. Cutting fur with scissors destroys the beauty of the hair and wastes much of the pelt that might be saved by the penknife process.

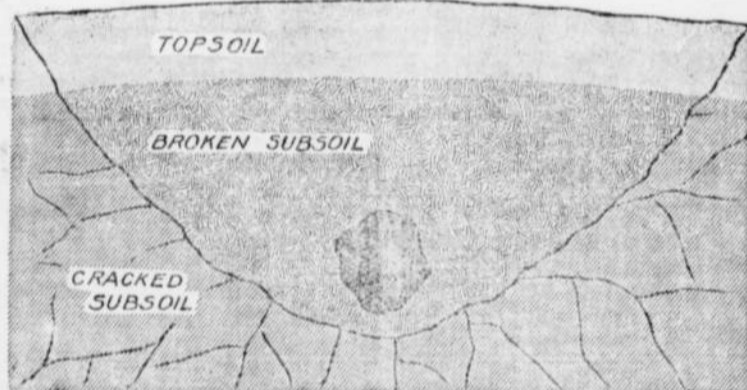
Blasting Ground For Tree Planting

Much has been written on how to plant a tree or trees, but if the experiences of scores of famous orchardists have any weight on the topic, then the practice of using dynamite preliminary to planting young trees has fully proved its merits.

The writer has personally seen specific examples of the value and excellence of tree planting with dynamite on a private orchard in Delaware, the

best time for tree planting is best done in the fall, because at this time of the year it is easier to catch the subsoil in dry condition. Blasting in the spring for spring planting, however, is much better than planting in dug holes, notwithstanding the fact that the subsoil is apt to be wet or damp.

If the holes are blasted in advance of the time of setting the trees they are left without further attention until



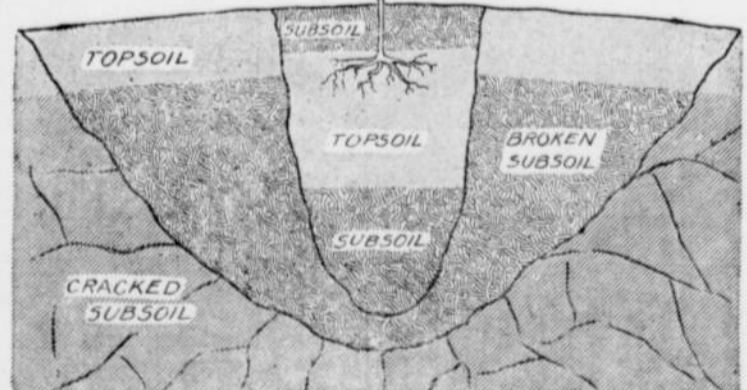

difference in growth between the undynamited tree and the tree planted in blasted ground being so unmistakably in favor of the latter that no adequate comparison could be made.

Furthermore, there are so many sane and logical reasons for this method of tree planting that even the most skeptical could not fail to be convinced. Obviously when a tree has to use a large part of its energies in forcing its roots through the hard soil it cannot be expected to make the same rapid growth and come into such

tree planting time, unless it is desirable to add some manure or fertilizer to be diffused through the soil. This is an excellent practice, especially in poor soil. If the earth is sour, sticky clay or heavy loam, a few pounds of lime scattered in the hole will materially assist in flocculating the clay and keeping it permanently granulated and sweet.

Immediately after the blast the soft blasted ground should be dug out down to the location of the charge, where a hole will usually be found about the size of a bushel basket. This

early bearing as a tree would that had had the ground in which it was planted thoroughly prepared by dynamiting beforehand.

No tree should be planted over hardpan or impacted subsoil without first resorting to blasting, so that the soil may be made open and porous. Such blasting not only creates channels, increases absorption of soil moisture and permits deeper rooting, but it also induces better growth and larger yields.

must be filled to prevent settling of the tree after planting. The roots should be placed in a natural position in good top soil, covered with more top soil and treaded down firm. The hole can then be filled to a little above the surface with subsoil.

The fact that nearly all commercial orchardists use this method proves that it pays in reduced first year loss, earlier fruiting and larger and better yields.
