England's Daily War Bill Near \$25,000,000.

London, Feb. 15—In parliament today Premier Asquith said that the forecast made several weeks ago of a daily expenditure for the war of \$25,000,000 had proved to be nearly accurate, and there were no prospects that the amount would be reduced. Obligations incurred by the war, he added, would impose a serious strain on the country for a generation to come. This burden he believed, could be met only by large additions to taxation and by maintenance of England's credit by keeping up the volume of exports, holding down unnecessary imports, and reducing expenditures.

Cheaper Hog Raising

Portland, Feb. 14—More than 100 farmers representing every section of the Willamette valley held an all-day session at the stock yards here today in an effort to devise methods of reducing the cost of production of hogs for market. Professor Thomas Shaw, agriculturist for the Northern Pacific and Great Northern railways, advised the farmers to raise more corn for hog feed. Several farmers present said they could not raise pork for less than six cents a pound under present conditions. Professor Shaw declared this cost could be materially reduced by feeding corn.

Big British Steamer Sunk

London, Feb. 14—The British steamer Cedarwood, 654 tons gross, has been sunk. Two members of her crew were saved. The British steamer Springwell, 5993 tons gross, from London to Calcutta, has been sunk in the Mediterranean. A dispatch from Malta says she was torpedoed without warning. The officers and crew were landed at Malta. Sixteen of the crew of the Norwegian ship Alabama, sunk by a mine or a torpedo in the North sea, have been landed here. Two were injured.

Two Killed When Auto and Limited Train Meet.

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 14—George L. Campbell and Porter McCall were killed last night when they were run down by a Northern Pacific limited train near Sumner, nine miles from this place while trying to cross the tracks in an auto when the crossing gong was ringing. The auto was thrown 60 feet and demolished; Campbell was instantly killed, and McCall was thrown 100 feet against a telegraph pole and so badly injured that he died some hours later. Campbell, an American, had but a short time ago been rejected by a Canadian regiment in Alberta because of spinal trouble when he offered to enlist. He was on his way for a visit to his mother at Seattle.

Northern Pacific Will Build Road at Yakima.
North Yakima, Wash., Feb. 15—The Northern Pacific announced here today that authority has been granted for the construction of 19 miles of road in the Yakima valley this year, the most important being in connection with seven miles between the present terminus of the branch line at Grandview, to Gibbon, on the main line. This will complete a loop between Sunnyside Junction, south of Toppenish to Gibbon, avoiding heavy grades near Prosser. The Fort Simcoe branch, 10 1/2 miles, from Harrah to White Swan, opening one of the best sections on the Yakima reservation, and the extension of the Cowiche branch are also included.

New York, Feb. 16—Detectives and uniformed police were assigned to patrol the park in the vicinity of the city hall today after Mayor Mitchell had received a letter signed "Canada," warning him that the city hall was to be set on fire.

Albany, Or., Feb. 16—John F. Short of Foster, this county, has the record

for big game so far this season, having brought to the county clerk's office on one day the skins of one coyote, four cougars and ten wildcats. The county and the state bounty on these skins brought Mr. Short \$121.50.

Dallas, Or., Feb. 12—The Polk county court has decided to dispense with the services of county road master this year, transferring the work to the supervisors and thereby saving \$100 a month.
