Chicago, Feb. 24—Distributing rumors that drastic consequences would result from tension between Washington and Berlin regarding Germany's submarine policy caused a break of more than 7 cents a bushel in the price of wheat, as compared with values current earlier in the session. Rainier Mill Starts Monday

Rainier, Or., Feb. 24—The Pacific National Lumber company's mill which has been shut down for the past two years and recently purchased by the American Export company, will resume operations next Monday with a full crew.

Silverton Is To Have New 250,000-Foot Sawmill.

Construction of a modern sawmill will be undertaken immediately by the Silver Falls Timber company at Silverton, according to announcement made by M. B. Woodward, general manager of the company, on his return to Portland from an Eastern business trip. The plant will have an initial capacity of 250,000 feet of lumber on a 10-hour run, and it is planned to have it completed September 1. Heretofore the company has been engaged solely in the logging business. The company has a standard-gauge logging road, extending 23 miles into its timber tracts in Marion and Clackamas counties. It has been idle about a year and a half but will be put into service soon. L. B. Menefee, vice president of the Silver Falls Timber company, believes the new mill will be operated steadily at full capacity as soon as completed.
