OBITUARY

Pioneer of 1852; Died at Talent, Wednesday.

Mrs. Martha E. Rapp, daughter of Woodford Reames, was born in Kentucky, Oct. 26, 1841, and with her parents crossed the plains with an ox team. After one year spent farther north, the family settled near Phoenix, in this county and in which Mrs. Rapp has ever since resided.

In 1876, Miss Martha married Joseph Rapp of Talent, but was left a widow in 1897. She then moved to Ashland where she remained until last year when she returned to the farm at Talent, remaining there until her death, Wednesday, March 22, 1916.

She leaves a son, Fred Rapp of Talent, and a sister, Mrs. Dora Harbough of this city. Funeral services conducted by Rev. Bandy, were held in Masonic Hall, this city, yesterday (Friday) afternoon. Interment in Jacksonville cemetery.
