## County Cannot Pay Every Second Week.

The county commissioners' proposal to pay regularly salaried employees of the county receiving less than \$100 a month every two weeks is illegal in the opinion of County Auditor Martin, County Treasurer Lewis and County Clerk Coffey. They submitted this theory to the commissioners this morning, with the information that jurors, witnesses and road laborers paid by the day are entitled to immediate payment.

After passing an order providing for the automatic resignation of any county employe who assigned his warrant after May 1, the commissioners decided to grant the small salaried men the right to draw their money twice a month. When the proposition was submitted to Martin, Lewis and Coffey they found it could not be legally carried out.—Telegram.

## Work on Big Sawmill Buildings is Being Rushed

Silverton, Or., April 26—The timber framework on the big Silver Falls Timber company mill is being erected rapidly. The entire foundation of the new mill is being made of concrete. It is expected that within the next few days the 12-acre pond will be excavated. The work will be done by a donkey engine and a large 21-man scraper. Over 40,000 cubic yards of dirt is to be moved. The Silverton Lumber company is saving the timbers of lumber for the new mill.

Beaverton, Or., April 25—Road work has begun in this end of the county on the Beaverton-Hillsboro road. This is the first step toward the completion of the main county road and will make a rock highway from the Yamhill county line to the Multnomah line. ## A Railroad School

Ambitious operators and station men anxious to improve themselves for promotion to the position of agent in the service of the Southern Pacific have an new opportunity to do so.

E. L. King superintendent of telegraph, has established a "Station School" at San Francisco for which all station operators may qualify as students. The course, which will last from three to four months, according to the individual's ability, takes up all phases of station work, with particular reference to dealings with the public. J. J. Miller, formerly agent at Red Bluff, is instructor.

The school is not to teach telegraphy but operators will be instructed in those features of it which apply to railroad work.

The class numbers twenty and as students are graduated others will be come eligible for their places. Those who are interested may apply for further details to Superintendent King at San Francisco.

Half of each day is spent in the class room. The balance of the time is devoted to actual station work under W. J. Hardy, freight agent at San Francisco. Students are paid a salary while in attendance. Every feature of the station agent's duties is taken up in detail. Handling and filing tariffs, freight rates and passenger fares, meeting the public, handling shipments are among the subjects regularly covered. Representatives from various departments of the general office and from the divisions from time to time will also make talks on special but pertinent subjects.
