Midnight Blaze Destroys Walsh Residence.

The house of Sam Walsh together with most of the contents was destroyed by fire at about 11 o'clock Thursday night, Mr. and Mrs. Walsh and daughter who were sleeping on the porch escaping in scanty attire. The house, an old wooden building was soon a mass of roaring flames from which it was impossible to retrieve the household goods which with the exception of a few articles were destroyed.

The origin of the fire is unknown: when first discovered it was in the ceiling and may have caught from a heated stovepipe, the family had retired and were awakened by the crackling of the fire. No insurance on building or contents.

White Pine Timbers Shipped

Harrison, Idaho, May 10—The loading and shipment of 10 cars of huge pine timbers for the use of the allies in Europe was completed here today under the inspection of a Canadian timber buyer. The timber is 40 to 40 feet long and from 24 to 40 inches thick. Seven car loads were billed to Baltimore and three to Quebec. The freight from Harrison to the coast was \$414 a car load. It is said that the selling price here of the timber was \$50 a thousand feet. The price of average lumber is \$15.


