



THE UNIVERSITY SUMMER SCHOOL

Ten Jackson County Students. In- crease in Attend- ance 66 per cent

University Of Oregon, July 12, 1916. (Special) F. C. Smith, of Jacksonville, is one of the students registered for the summer session of the University of Oregon. He is taking a course in physics under Dr. W. P. Boynton, of the University, and also work in Spanish under Prof. Cloran.

Other students from Jackson County are: Jessie Furdy, J. M. Gressly, Thora Smith, Mildred G. Brown, P. H. Daily, and Eunice Davis, of Medford; Mr. and Mrs. B. G. Harding, of Rogue River; Carroll M. Wagner, of Ashland.

The University Summer School this year shows an increase in attendance of more than 66 per cent over last year, and more than 100 per cent over the year before, constituting one of the most rapid gains in size in such a short period ever made by an old established institution in the state. The summer school has been in existence eleven years, but its great spur in growth dates, like that of other departments of the University, from the time of the withdrawal of the Oregon educational institutions from the field of politics, and from the establishment of a high standard of graduate work in all the summer courses.

The summer students are said to average more than 30 years of age, many of them being successful men and women in many lines of work.

Numerous married couples are registered this year, husbands and wives taking work together. The overwhelming majority of the students are Oregonians, but the following states are represented: Washington, California, Idaho, Montana, Iowa, Kentucky, Arizona, Kansas, and the province of New Brunswick. The most distant student comes from Amoy South China.

GERMAN SUBMARINE CROSSES OCEAN

Merchant Submarine Deutschland Buys British Blockade, Lands at Bal- timore

BALTIMORE, July 10.—Upon delivering his ship's papers to the offices of the North German Lloyd line today, Captain Paul Konig of the submarine merchantman Deutschland, issued a formal statement declaring his voyage across the Atlantic had broken England's rule of the seas.—The statement was in part as follows:

"The submarine Deutschland, which I have the honor to command, is the first of several submarines built to order for the Deutsch Ocean-Rheiden G. M. B. H., Bremen. She will be followed by the Bremen shortly.

"We have brought a most valuable cargo of dyestuffs to our American friends, dyestuffs which have been so much needed six months in America and which the ruler of the seas has not allowed the great American republic to import. While England will not allow anybody the same right on the ocean, because she rules the waves, we have by means of the submarine commenced to break this rule.

"Great Britain cannot, however, hinder boats such as ours to go and come as we please. Our trip passing Dover, across the ocean was an uneventful one. When danger approached we went beneath the surface and here we are safely in an American port, ready to return in due course.

"I am not in a position to give you details regarding our trip across the ocean, in view of our enemies. Our boat has a displacement of about 2000 tons, and a speed of more than 14 knots. Needless to say that we are quite unarmed and only a peaceful merchantman.

Judge McNary Elected

Chairman Accepts Office

Salem, Or., July 10.—In announcing that he would accept the chairman ship of the Republican state central committee, Judge Charles L. McNary today said that he would do all that he could to aid in the election of the state and national tickets. Judge McNary was elected at a meeting held by the committee in Portland Saturday.

"I had no intimation of my selection as chairman until after the act was accomplished and I shall do all I can to assist in the election of the splendid state and national tickets chosen by the electorate in the open primaries last May," he said. "I appreciate most keenly the value of a united Republican party having for its purpose the restoration of American ideals of honor and dignity abroad and the welfare of the masses at home. Therefore, I contemplate with pleasure the unification of the Republican and Progressive parties.

"It was fortunate for Charles Evans Hughes that the people of Oregon could express their preference without political or legal hindrance, and it is equally fortunate that the agents of the people at the Chicago convention harkened to the voice of our commonwealth and nominated him as the candidate of a united and triumphant party.

Singing Evangelist Is Found Dead In His Home

Hillsboro, Or., July 10.—George A. Webb, of this city, was found dead at his residence yesterday afternoon, having apparently died from apoplexy about two days before. He leaves a wife who was absent visiting relatives in Baker county. Deceased was born in Illinois about 65 years ago and he and his wife were professional singing evangelists and both have traveled extensively over the country holding meetings for the Christian church, of which both were members. They have resided here about 10 years. Funeral arrangements will not be made until Mrs. Webb's return.

Myrtle Man Runs

Over And Kills Girl

Marshfield, Or., July 10.—Florence Dye aged about 22, was run down and killed last evening by an auto one mile outside of Myrtle Point. Chris Moller, the driver, was not held, as the officers are convinced that it was an accident. They claim he was new at handling a car. The woman crossed the road to escape the car and even stood at one side, but the machine swerved. The injured girl was brought to town in a machine, but lived only a few minutes.

Civil War Veteran Is Dead

Salem, Or., July 10.—After a lingering illness, S. S. Gimble, a Civil war veteran, died here today aged 71 years. He came to Oregon from Ohio 25 years ago, and his only relatives surviving him are in Germany.

Salem, Or., July 10.—Gustav Weighelt, a trusty who escaped from the penitentiary yesterday, was still at large this forenoon. He was serving a term for Crook county for assault with a dangerous weapon.

German War Loses Are

Now Placed at 3,012,637

London, July 10.—German casualties from the beginning of the war to the end of June, as computed from official German lists, are given as 3,012,637 in an official statement made public here. The announcement says: "These figures include all German nationalities. They do not include naval casualties of colonial troops. They are not an estimate made by the British authorities, but mere casualties announced in German official lists."

Good Roads Bill Is

Washington, July 11.—President Wilson today signed the good roads bill, recently passed by congress, authorizing the expenditure of \$35,000,000 in five years by the federal government on condition that states expend amount similar to those apportioned by the bill.

Dr. Valdez s Elected

President of Panama

New Head of Republic to Succeed Belariso Porras Next Month.

San Francisco, July 11.—Dr. Ramon M. Valdez, candidate of the Liberal party for president of the republic of Panama is reported in a cablegram to Senor A. Eladio Briceno, acting Panama consul, to have been elected at the elections throughout the republic on Sunday. No indications regarding trouble during the balloting was given in the message. Dr. Valdez is popularly regarded in Panama as having had the backing of President Belariso Porras, whom he will succeed in August. The election is the culmination of one of the bitterest and most acrimonious campaigns in the history of the republic.

Railroad Contract Carries

Three To One at Med- ford Election Monday

By a vote of nearly 3 to 1 at Monday's election, the people of Medford ratified the proposed contract with Mr. Bullis for the construction of the railroad to the Blue Ledge Mining district. The exact vote was 1003 for the contract and 365 against it, giving a majority of 643 votes.

While the result was never in doubt, the majority in favor of the proposed contract was larger than even the friends of the measure had expected, in view of the opposition of certain parties said to be interested in a rival proposition and who embraced every opportunity to "knock" the undertaking.

The friends of the measure celebrated their victory in an enthusiastic manner with a parade of automobiles with tooting horns, drums and whistles, serenading many of the opponents of the measure, in style. Speeches were made by several prominent leaders of the movement.

Washington Woman Gets

1 To 20 Years in Prison

Vancouver, Wash., July 10.—Mrs. Bessie Mitchell, who on the night of June 4, last, shot and killed her husband in their home in this city, following their return from a picture show and after a violent quarrel which ended with a threat by the man that he would leave his family, appeared in the superior court here this morning and pleaded guilty to manslaughter. Mrs. Mitchell waived time, and was sentenced to serve an indeterminate term from one year to 20 years in the penitentiary. As it is customary to have a prisoner, otherwise well behaved, to serve only the minimum of the sentence, it is believed that she will be released from the prison in the course of one year. She will begin serving her sentence at once.

Elks Grand Lodge

Holds First Session

Baltimore, July 11.—The first business session of the grand lodge of the Order of Elks was held this morning. The records of the registration bureau showed that 7500 people had registered and officials estimated that twice that number actually arrived in the city. According to Grand Exalted Ruler James R. Nicholson, of Boston, the total number of Elks now in the order is 453,000, and there are 1340 lodges.
