**Pittsburg Postmaster Is Taken From Office**  
Washington, July 19.—Postoffice department officials admitted Dr. George W. McNeil, postmaster at Pittsburg, had been dismissed. Concerning the dismissal, the official bulletin of the department says: "Notice to postmasters—A postmaster at one of the most important postoffices in the United States has been removed for failure to cooperate with the department in carrying out its instructions regarding the conduct of the service in his city."

**DARDANELLES IS PROMISED RUSSIA**  
London, July 19.—That Russia has been promised possession of both sides of the Dardanelles is stated categorically in a summary of the proceedings of the army and navy committee of the duma, as published in the Petrograd newspaper Russky Slovoe. The newspaper summarizes the report of the Russian parliamentary delegates to the committee on their return from a recent trip to the entente allied countries, and adds that the most interesting statement was made by Professor Mikukoff, who said:

"The most important question in which we were interested was the problem of the Dardanelles. An agreement has been made between Russia and her allies whereby we are promised both sides of the straits. This agreement has not been published but we consider it our duty to make it known."
