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ZEPPELINS TO CARRY MAIL

To Fly From Berlin to New York In 72 Hours

Chicago, Sept. 5.—“Two double” Zeppelins, unarmed and each with a carrying capacity of sixty tons, have been built in Germany to carry mail between Berlin and the United States according to statements here today by Morris Epstein, agent of the German-American alliance, who returned from Europe today.

Epstein said the Zeppelins had been christened “Amerika” and “Deutschland.” They can make the aerial voyage between Berlin and New York in 72 hours, he said.

“They are so constructed” said Epstein, “that they can rise higher than any aeroplane and thus escape hostile aviators. They also can descend to the water and travel there under their own power.”

Epstein said the postage charges for this service had already been arranged and would be regular postage one mark or twenty-five cents for each letter.

Oregon's Mineral

Product in 1915

Following is a summary of the gold, silver, copper and lead produced in 1915, as reported by Chas. G. Yale of U. S. Geological Survey.

Gold from deep mines, \$1,379,626—placer \$482,170, total \$1,861,796; silver fine ounces, 117,947; copper, pounds 451,172; lead, pounds 62,957. The total value of these minerals produced in 1915 is \$2,003,509 as against \$1,676,153 produced in 1914, an increase of \$327,356.

Jackson county is credited with having produced \$30,201 of gold during the year and is entitled to fourth place, being exceeded only by Baker, Josephine and Malheur.

Difference in Complexions.

The difference in the complexions of people is due to the varying amounts of pigment or coloring materials in the cells of the skin. Very light people have very little pigment; very dark people, those with dark eyes and black hair, have a great deal of this coloring material in their cells. A great many people are neither light nor very dark. They have less than the dark complexioned people and more than the light complexioned people. When the hair turns gray it is because the pigment has disappeared. As this is due to the loss of this coloring material, dark complexioned people turn gray sooner than light complexioned people. The structure of the skin showing how these cells are made in layers can be seen by examining the skin with a microscope.

Water Birds.

Water birds, singular as it seems, are the only ones whose skins never by any chance get touched by water. So long as they are alive and long after they are dead they float with an air chamber all round their bodies, cunningly contrived of waterproof feathers closely overlapping each other. RUSSIANS SENT TO

DEFEND ROUMANIA

Berlin, Sept. 5, via London.—The German and Bulgarian army which is invading Eastern Roumania has carried by storm the fortified advanced positions at the bridgehead of Tairakan, the war office announced today. The Bulgarians have taken the town of Dobrie.

Petrograd, Sept. 5, via London.—Russians and Bulgarians are fighting in Roumania, the war office announced today, and the first clash between the Bulgarians, who have invaded Eastern Roumania, and the Russians, who went in to assist Roumania, occurred yesterday. A Bulgarian cavalry outpost was sabred by Russian cavalry.

Forest Notes

Assistant District Forester F. E. Ames has just returned to Portland, Oregon, from a six weeks' trip, during which he visited eight of the National Forests of Oregon and Washington. Forest inspector R. Y. Stuart of Washington, D. C., accompanied him on this trip. Twelve large timber sale areas were inspected, and Mr. Ames reports that the conditions on these sales are generally satisfactory.

The largest sale visited was at Pelican Bay, on the Crater National Forest. The daily cut here runs from 225 to 250 M board feet. This is the largest sale in the District, and is probably the largest cut being made on any National Forest timber sale in the country.
