Klockke was delighted. Running into a room where Hilda was, he called to her that he had succeeded in his effort. He expected that she would rejoice with him at his success. Instead, she looked at him angrily and told him that since he had found another who could do what she could not do he might take the other for a sweetheart. He was very much astonished at this, for he had always found Hilda's disposition of the sweetest. However, after much coaxing he persuaded her to go with him into the room where he had worked.
