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A Sorry, Insincere Bluff

Again last week, President Wilson in a public speech, declared that the people need fear no war, because those who desire war will fail in electing the president they want.

Could a more cowardly appeal for votes be made than that? Could a more cringing confession be made by a president who in simulated rage sent our whole Atlantic fleet to Vera Cruz on the spoken assumption that the flag had been dishonored?

What is it except a confession that his whole performance then was but a sorry, insincere bluff intended to influence the then pending congressional election? Of the same nature and for the same purpose that he a few months ago broke out in a scream for preparedness, and later rushed a bill through congress to fix the day's labor of a certain class of employees at eight hours without investigating whether the demand was just or not, though \$50,000,000 of the people's money per annum was involved in the transaction.

And that too, under a threat of those men that it must be done within five days, or they would smash things? Who believes that President Wilson would have done what he then did, had the proposition come three years sooner or had been postponed four months later?

No American wants war until the situation becomes such that not to fight would be a disgrace, and no real American, for the sake of peace wants a compromise made at the sacrifice of justice and honor, and which leaves Americans the prey of lust and the desire of bandits for blood and loot.

The Man We Need

Southern Oregon needs representatives in the legislature who can present the claims of this section in an intelligent, attractive and convincing manner and who in debate can hold their own against any opponents they are likely to meet. Such a man is Ben C. Sheldon, a man of good address, honest and fearless, a good speaker and convincing reasoner, well up in parliamentary rules and procedure, has an acquaintanceship with prominent people in the sections of the state and is well qualified to "bring home the bacon." Republicans and democrats of Jackson county should one and all vote for Sheldon.

Amendments Adopted Immediately Effective.

Whatever constitutional amendments or initiative bills on the ballot at the election next Tuesday are accepted by the voters, will become effective at 8 o'clock, the time of closing the polls on the night of the election. Many voters are of the opinion that if passed the measures will not go into effect until 30 days after the election or until the official vote is canvassed by the secretary of state, but this is not the case. Court decisions are that they will go into effect immediately after the last vote is cast in the election.

Big Timber Rafts Not to Go Through Canal.

Washington, Oct. 31—The Benson Timber company, of California, asks permission to send timber rafts through the Panama Canal each raft to be 1000 feet long with a draft 28 feet, and carrying roughly 46,000,000 feet. The Panama canal Washington offices advise Senator Chamberlain that the limit for rafts plying the Panama canal is 650 feet in length and 25-foot draft, but promises to refer the Clatskanie firm's application to the governor of the canal zone for a report.

Cottage Grove's Big Oil Plant Near Completion.

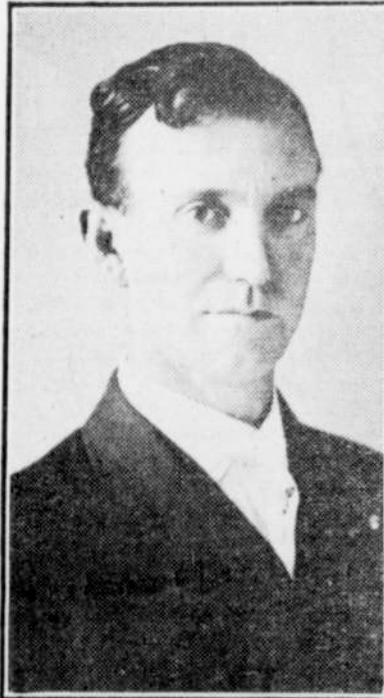
Cottage Grove, Or., Oct. 31—The big plant of the Standard Oil company here is nearing completion, the oil tanks have arrived and will soon be put in place by Contractor W. L. Hobbs. When this plant is completed it will be the largest of its kind in the surrounding country. Some of the oil is to be supplied from here at Doane, Disston, London, Loran and Drain.

Pastor Russell Dies on Train

Charles T. Russell, formerly known as "Pastor Russell, of Brooklyn, died Tuesday on a train enroute from Los Angeles to New York. Heart disease was given as the cause.

Mr. Russell was a native of Pennsylvania and was born in 1852. Observation and study of the creeds and polity of the different church organizations in early life led him to almost infidelity but a thorough searching and study of the bible convinced him that the plan of salvation was plain to those "with an eye to see." He devoted his whole life and fortune to a dissemination of the "Plan of the Ages," as he saw it and to this end was the author of a work in six volumes, entitled Millennial Dawn, the editions of which reached into millions and was translated and published in twelve or thirteen different languages and today is the most widely read work in the world.

Resides his labors as an author and editor, Mr. Russell devoted much time to speaking from the public platform in many of the principal places in this country and Great Britain. His life was one of sacrifice for the cause he loved.

Much spruce of both the eastern and western varieties is used for sounding boards of pianos and organs. Its natural resonance has won it first place for this purpose.

Of the present total supply of hardwoods in the country, sixty-one per cent is located in the southern States. The Appalachian hardwood region is at present the greatest center of hardwood production.

Within the past year, the Forest Products Laboratory, Madison, Wis., by cooperation with manufacturers, has succeeded in getting a dye, made from mill waste of orange, put on the market as a substitute for fustic which we import from Jamaica and Tehuantepec.

About nine-tenths of the paper which we use is made from wood. Many of the so called "silk" socks, neckties, and handkerchiefs are made from wood.

ASHLAND PRESIDENT FAVORS PENDLETON

NEED OF EASTERN OREGON SCHOOL FULLY SHOWN BY B. F. MULKEY, FORMER HEAD OF ASHLAND SCHOOL.

Portland, Ore.—The Honorable B. F. Mulkey, ex-President of the Southern Oregon Normal School at Ashland, says, concerning the establishment of an additional Normal School at Pendleton: "I shall support the measure heartily for the reason that the present Normal School, though one of the best in the country, cannot be adequate to meet the needs of so large a state as Oregon. There is no institution that touches the masses of the people so closely as does the Normal School and the benefit derived from the taxes paid by the people of the state for the maintenance of such schools returns directly to the man and woman who paid the taxes and is conferred directly upon them and their children. The expense of maintaining a good Normal School in Eastern Oregon to a taxpayer on an assessed valuation of \$4000.00 would each year be under the cost of a good Havana cigar. I sincerely hope that the coming election will grant to the people of Eastern Oregon the relief they seek in a Normal School."

BUSINESSMEN ARE FOR NEW NORMAL

PORTLAND CHAMBER OF COMMERCE STRONGLY ENDORSES BILL FOR SCHOOL TO BE LOCATED AT PENDLETON.

Portland, Ore.—The Portland Chamber of Commerce, which stands at the head of the businessmen's organization of the state, recently endorsed the measure proposing a Normal School at Pendleton in a resolution, giving the following reasons:

"We believe that Eastern Oregon is reasonable in its demands that such a school be located east of the Cascade mountains, hence we recommend its location at Pendleton as the most logical for the following reasons:

"First, it is a city of some size, having an enrollment of over 1,000 grade pupils.

"Second, Pendleton is very accessible, having over twenty passenger trains each day from five directions.

"Third, its location is as near central as could be expected, making it easy of access at a moderate cost to the students.

"Fourth, it is our understanding that the citizens of Pendleton propose to donate a very favorable site for the school.

"Fifth, many other advantages are: A good public library, several churches, pure water and a live, intelligent community that will take pride in the progress of the school."

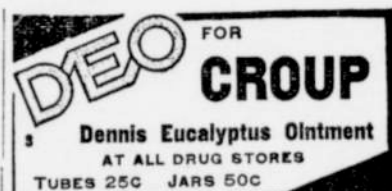
