**Ship Carpenters Are Being Asked to Register.**

Trade at Home

All experienced ship carpenters in this zone are asked by the government to register in the office of R. P. Bonham, United States immigration inspector in charge, on the fifth floor of the Railway Exchange building.

This request came from Washington Saturday. About dozen skilled men in the trade called on Inspector Bonham this morning and left their names and addresses. Many more are expected to register today. Charles P. Howard, president of the Central Labor council has agreed to obtain a list of the ship carpenters in the city and send the names and addresses to the immigration office.

Steps are being taken to obtain a list of the ship carpenters in Astoria, Tillamook and Coos bay for keeping on file. A list of all of the available men in Oregon and tributary territory for filling the requirements is expected to be obtained in a short time.

The skilled men may be wanted for assisting the shipping board in organizing and training workers.
