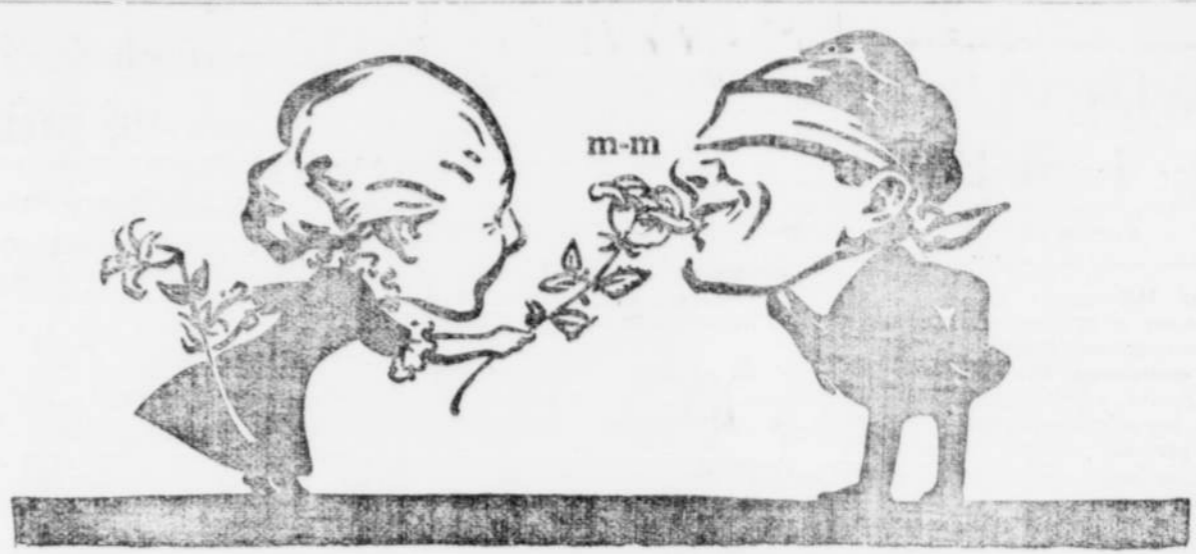

Treasonable Words Land Man In Jail.

Tillamook, Or., April 25—Justice of the Peace Stanbury yesterday sentenced Ed Hummel to ten days in jail and to pay a fine of \$50 and costs. Hummel was arrested for using treasonable language, saying that he would fight for Germany if the United States got into war with that country. District Attorney T. H. Goyne put up a strong case against Hummel, placing a dozen witnesses on the stand, all of whom testified to the treasonable language used by Hummel at different times.

Hummel is a native born citizen but of German extraction and is bitter against all countries fighting against Germany.
