



Tillamook, Or., April 25-Justice of the Peace Stanbury yesterday sentenced Ed Hummet to ten days in jail and to pay a fine of \$50 and costs. Hummel was arrested for using tressonable language, saying that he would fight for German if the United States got into war with that country. District Attorney T. H. Goyne put up a strong case against Hummel, placing a dozen witnesses on the stand, all of whom testified to the treasonable language

Hummel is a native born citizen but of German extraction and is bitter against all countries fighting against
