The State sealer of weights and measures calls attention to the requirements of the law: "that berries must be sold in standard boxes, up to and including one quart and that the boxes must be well packed. The purchaser is entitled to a box of berries wellpacked and level full. The standard box (quart) shall be of interior capacity of 67.2 cubic inches and the pint 33.6 cubic inches." Vigorous prosecutions are ordered for violations of the law.

30 Wooden Ships to Be Built on Pacific.

South Bend, Wash., May 3—Word was received in South Bend and Raymond today that the United States government had awarded T. S. Desmond & Co., of New York City, engineers, a contract to build 30 wooden cargo ships, the yards for the building of which are to be located on Grays Harbor and on Willapa Harbor. These yards will have a capacity of building twenty ships at a time. The completed ships will be taken through the Panama Canal to the Atlantic Coast.

Says Mexico Will Not Embarrass U. S. in War.

Washington, May 3—Louis Cabrera, General Carranza's minister of finance, in a letter to Secretary Lane, with whom he sat on the Mexican-American commission, pledges not only Mexico's neutrality, but his government's intention to do nothing to embarrass the United States in the war with Germany.

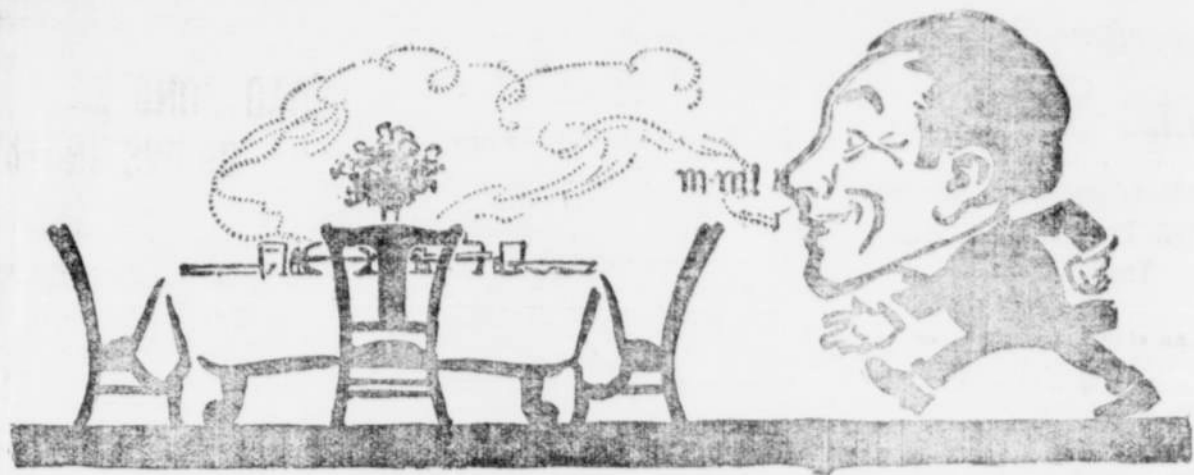

Live-lock Hit by Late Season

Livestock conditions in the National Forest regions of Washington are good with a fairly high lambing average, according to reports received by District Forester George H. Cecil, Portland, Oregon. In Oregon stock conditions are below normal in the National Forest regions. This is due to the unusually long feeding season. In many sections the hay is entirely used up.

In the Bechutes country, near the Fremont National Forest, the upper John Day country, and in Baker county, Oregon, will occur the severest losses on account of late season and hay shortage. Most range cattle in Oregon and Washington have come through the winter in rather poor condition.

To meet the emergency which exists the Supervisors of the National Forests in Oregon and Washington have been authorized to open them to livestock which is short of feed earlier than the usual date, whenever it can be done without material injury to the early grasses. The Forest Service will make every effort to aid the stockmen in saving their animals from starvation.
