The high price to which flour and other food supplies have been forced by speculators prove the need of the government fixing a maximum price for foodstuffs, rather than the minimum so much talked of.

W. E. Collins and Sam Slide, accused of the recent robbery at Phoenix were bound over to the grand jury by Justice Taylor of Medford, Monday. Bail was fixed at \$1000 each, in default of which they were committed to the county jail in this city.

One of the laws enacted by the recent legislature and which becomes effective May 21, fixes the rate to be charged by newspapers for legal advertising at 65 cents per folio of 250 ems of whatever sized type the ad is set in. In 8 point type, the size most papers use, 19 ems make one line, hence the rate will be, 5 cents per line each insertion. If smaller type is used there will be fewer lines with more ems in a line, but the charge will be just the same as if 8 point type was used.
