Senator Harry Lane Is Dead
United States Senator Harry Lane died Wednesday night at a San Francisco hospital following a nervous disorder produced by a blood-clot on the brain. The Oregon senator was stricken while in Washington and stopped in San Francisco while en route to his home in Oregon. He was 62 years of age and survived by a widow and two daughters. He was the son of an Oregon pioneer and the grandson of the first territorial governor of Oregon General Joseph Lane. Prior to his election as senator he held only one political position, mayor of Portland for two terms. Senator Lane was one of the central figures in the opposition to the recent war measures in congress.

Switzerland In Fear Of Embargo On Food
Bern, May 25, via Paris May 21—President Schulthess, speaking today on the Swiss economic situation at a Radical Democratic Congress, dwelt particularly on the possible consequences of the entry of the United States into the war to Switzerland's food supply. He expressed the firm hope of the federal government that the United States would not make Switzerland's existence impossible. He also voiced the conviction that the entire nation would be behind the federal council at the critical moment to safeguard the country's independence on a footing of the strictest neutrality.

Cove, Or., May 22—Sixteen of Cove's cherry orchardists have contracted 413 tons of cherries to Duvy & Co., of Chicago, and Karl J.
