Redding, June 6.—Lassen peak erupted again yesterday, following the two eruptions Monday. Smoke from the crater drifted northward about 30 miles. The rumblings preceding the eruption were loud and distinct.

Recall Carried in Baker County

Baker, Or., June 6.—That recall of County Judge J. B. Messick and County Commissioner J. P. Ritter was successful, and that William Daby has been elected judge, and Judge John Fraser, named commissioner, is admitted by the Messick and Ritter supporters. It is expected that the final returns will show the recall to have carried by about 80 votes, it having a lead of 40 votes at noon on incomplete returns from 39 out of 41 precincts in the county.

Accident Brings Death To Klamath Lumberman

Klamath Falls, Or., June 6.—El Morris, age 46, and with no known relatives, died at the hospital Sunday night from the effect of an accident. Four days before he had been driving to the city from the Turner mill, at which he was employed, with a load of lumber and fell off in front of the wagon. His chest was badly crushed by one of the wheels. A passing automobile brought him to the city.

Oregon Registered 62,985 For War

Portland, June 8.—Oregon registered 62,985 men for the selective draft June 5, according to a telegram sent Provost Marshal General Crowder at Washington last night by Adjutant-General George A. White for Governor James Withycomb. Of the total registered, 55,870 were white and 130 colored. The indicated possible exemptions numbered 32,944. The war department's estimated total of eligibles in Oregon was 108,150.

Our Losses by Fire. If our total thought all the buildings destroyed by fire in the United States in a year amounting to about one billion, each building occupying a lot sixty-five feet wide, the highway would extend from New York to Chicago, and the buildings would line it on each side. Such is the calculation of the department of the interior. Furthermore, a person traveling this scene of desolation would pass in every thousand feet a ruin from which an injured person has been taken. At every three-quarters of a mile he would encounter the remains of a human being who had been burned to death.

For years, it is estimated, the amount of actual property annually consumed by fire in this country reaches \$250,000,000, and another sum of about like proportions is spent for the maintenance of fire departments, waterworks, insurance premiums, etc., to prevent still greater losses.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Care of Silk Stockings. Of course you know that nothing, however durable, will wear either well or long if not cared for properly. Silk stockings are no exception to this rule. They demand proper care. First and foremost, washing every time the stocking is worn is almost imperative. Perspiration tends to rot the fiber, consequently the little holes that pop out so unexpectedly. Make a lather from a mild white soap, "swish" the stockings about in it, rinse and iron when quite damp. If the stocking is only mended and you desire the silky sheen, then rinse in water that is a bit soapy and press damp. And a word about mending: Silk on cotton and cotton on silk is easy to remember and a deal more satisfactory in the long run.


The First Iron Bridge. It was built in the year 1778 and is exactly ninety-six feet in length. The total amount of iron used in its construction was 375 tons. ***** PRACTICAL HEALTH HINT. ***** Chronic Rheumatism. Although acute rheumatism may occur at any age, it is more common in adolescence or in early adult life; chronic rheumatism is essentially a disease of later life. It often attacks sailors and outdoor laborers, who apparently bring on the malady by exposing themselves to cold and wet or by overworking or falling to eat nourishing food. Treatment of chronic rheumatism is very unsatisfactory; no actual cure is known, and the most that can be done is to relieve the pain and stiffness during the attacks and try to prevent or delay their recurrence. Unless the pain is so bad as to call for an anodyne, much comfort can be obtained by rubbing and massage and the application of a hot water bag to the joints. For constitutional treatment, in addition to internal anti-rheumatic remedies, benefit sometimes comes from a sojourn at a mineral spring resort. The patient should have a simple, nourishing diet and should avoid exposure in cold and damp weather. *****

Waters of Fish Lake Dam Break Through.

Medford, Or., June 5.—Fish Lake dam, which broke last night and the waters of which were reported beyond control at an early hour this morning is now under control. The Medford city water supply will not be affected. The dam is that of the Rogue River Canal company, from whose mountain reservoir thousands of acres of valley farms and orchards are irrigated. A new section of the dam gave way. A large force of men is repairing the break and the damage is not as great as was believed at first.

No More Applicants Admitted at Presidio.

Washington, June 4.—Senator Chamberlain is advised by General Liggitt that the quota at the Presidio training camp is filled and no further applicants can be designated to attend the present camp. Senator Chamberlain has been notified that the offer of the Hermiston Commercial club for a site for a training camp has been referred by the war department to General Liggitt, who has jurisdiction of the establishment of military camps in the Western department.

Second Training Camp Planned

San Francisco, June 5.—Applications for admittance to the second reserve officers' training camp at the Presidio will be accepted on and after June 15, according to orders received here yesterday from the war department by the lieutenant colonel commanding the military camp. The second camp will open August 27 and 2500 men will be selected. Applications received before June 15 will not be considered.

Idaho Man Arrested

American Falls, Idaho, June 5.—Three well-known citizens of this city were arrested late yesterday afternoon for using alleged traitorous language against the government of the United States, talking against registration for selective draft and making derogatory remarks about President Wilson. Secret service men are watching other suspects and arrests will follow any agitation against the draft.

Spain Takes Stand in Behalf of Jews.

Madrid, via Paris, June 5.—The Spanish government, it is announced in the newspapers, has instructed its representatives in Berlin, Vienna and Constantinople to present an urgent note demanding that there be an end to the persecutions, deportations and lootings practiced against the Jews in Palestine.

North Yakima, Wash., June 6.—Out of a total population of about 50,000 in Yakima county, 4512 men registered and 2241 claimed exemptions. The recruiting officers are this morning besieged by men who registered yesterday and now wish to enlist and avoid the draft.

German Warship Sunk

London, June 5.—A German destroyer has been sunk and another damaged in a fight between six German destroyers and Commodore Tyrwhitt's squadron, the admiralty announces. The Germans naval base at Ostend, on the Belgian coast, has been bombarded by a British warship. The British forces were undamaged.
