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## Mr. Hoover's Assurance

SOMEHOW or other, we have come to place considerable faith in the judgment of the new food dictator, Herbert Hoover, and so when he informs the country that it has become unnecessarily excited over the alleged food shortage, we are disposed to feel a bit more comfortable.

According to Mr. Hoover, "there is absolutely no occasion for food-panic in this country, nor any justification for outrageous price, unless the opposition of special interests defeats the President in obtaining the necessary powers to control the nation's food fully and adequately." If this is all that stands in the way of the desired relief, then congress should immediately grant summary powers to the President. The probabilities are that the power conferred will be delegated in turn to Mr. Hoover, and that arrangement seems most desirable, for he appears to be the one man capable of controlling the situations.

Mr. Hoover further assures us that we have a surplus of foodstuffs at the present time and that next year this will increase. Hence the current fear of a famine is not well founded. The food dictator proposes that we shall feed the Allies, only "after the proper protection of our own people" is effected. If this policy is pursued, there will no longer be any occasion to fear the consequence of the government, acting as a purchasing agent for the Allies, becoming a competitor of the individual citizen in the purchase of foodstuffs on the open market.

On the other hand, it is intimated that the program of food control will temporarily close our markets to the world and prohibit foreign purchasers from competing with the speculators in this country. Whether this move will automatically force price down to a reasonable level, or whether it will be necessary eventually for the government to intervene and fix the prices, is still a questionable matter. It would, indeed, be a double satisfaction if Mr. Hoover would clear up this point, for while it is good to know that there is sufficient food in sight, we would like to know whether we will be able to meet the prices.

## RAILROAD TRAINS MEN

### Agency School Established at San Francisco.

Ambitious young men possessed of a grammar school education have a wonderful opportunity these days to enter the railroad service and rise rapidly. This is the view of E. L. King, superintendent of telegrams for the Southern Pacific Company.

War time conditions have brought about a tremendous demand for transportation facilities. This demand will continue long after the war closes because of the period of reconstruction and rehabilitation that will follow.

To meet the problem of securing trained railroad men and developing them for responsible positions, the Southern Pacific Company has established in San Francisco an "Agency School" under Superintendent of Telegrapher King where an apprenticeship course in railroad work is given and the student at the same time is paid while learning.

The plan is proving highly successful. Boys coming from the country and ambitious to "get a start" master the course in from three to four months. Half the time is spent in the class room, and the balance in actual station work. Railroad telegraphy and all the duties of a station agent are taught. Officials of the Company lecture to the students on all phases of the transportation question. There is still room in the school for more students.

Good paying positions out on the Company's lines await the graduates. Over sixty young men have acquired positions in this way since the school has opened.

### Contracts are Let For Sixteen Wooden Ships.

Washington, June 11—Contracts for construction of 16 wooden ships were let today by Major General George W. Goethals, general manager of the shipping board's emergency fleet corporation.

Ten went to Sanderson & Porter, a New York concern, and six to the Maryland Shipbuilding company, of Baltimore.
