The complete official returns show the total war registration in Jackson County to be 1379. Of these, 23 claim total disability; 730 indicate dependent relatives; 86 probable occupational exemptions. 508 persons indicated no exemptions.

Marshal Wilson has notified water users that the regulations fixing time to use city water are now in effect. Use water for gardens, lawns, and streets, only between 6 and 8 o'clock in the mornings and between 6 and 8 o'clock in the evenings. The ordinance provides a penalty for violation of these rules.

The second trial of Mrs. M. M. Garwood, charged with conspiracy in the burning of a house at Ashland, last winter, held Monday and Tuesday, resulted in the acquittal of the defendant the jury being out only a few minutes. Mrs. Strickfadden, owner of the house and her sister, Mrs. Dryfuss plead guilty before the first trial and endeavored to throw the blame of the burning on Mrs. Garwood, who they claimed had engineered the whole affair.

In the case of the State vs Chas. Gay of Medford, probation officer of Jackson county, indicted by the grand jury for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, on trial in the circuit court Wednesday, the court directed the jury to bring in a verdict of "not guilty," motion to that effect having been made by defendant's counsel who alleged that not "sufficient evidence" had been submitted to justify the case going to the jury: this is about equal to the old Scotch verdict of "not proven". A large crowd was present at the trial, many of the details of which were racy enough to satisfy the most depraved taste. The directed verdict was due to the fact that the statements of the complaining witness were not corroborated by other evidence and as she was plainly an accomplice, the court had no option in the matter.

This, if divided pro rata would be about \$1.50 for each registered voter: some, however, will not contribute anything and those who can should give all they can spare in order that the full amount be raised.

Ten Thousand Dollars is the amount of Liberty Bonds bought in Jacksonville. The buyers are: J. W. Bybee, E. Britt, W. G. Caudill, D. W. Bagshaw Jr., Mrs. Charles Conner, G. A. Gardner, Lewis Ulrich, J. M. Williams and Lela Williams. Besides the above named, Mrs. Julia E. Beekman and Miss Carrie C. Beekman have each purchased \$5,000 worth of the bonds through a Portland bank which amount, if credited to Jacksonville make the total \$20,000.

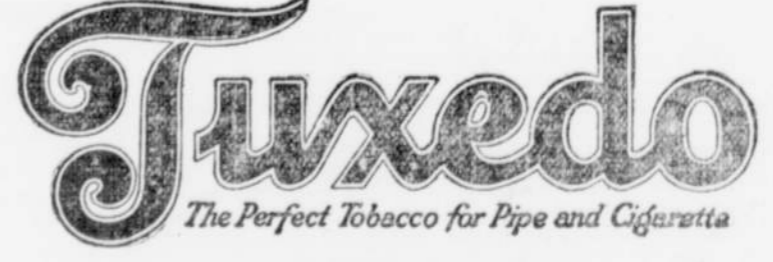
