American Ship U-Boat Victim

Plymouth, England, July 30.—The American bark Carmela has been sunk by a submarine. The crew was landed in safety.

All the members of the bark's crew which numbered twenty men, were uninjured. They will be sent to New York. The Carmela was attacked at 6 o'clock this morning by a German submarine of small type. The undersized boat fired four shots at her and the crew then took to their boat.

The submarine ordered the boat's crew to go aboard the submarine, and placing an armed guard over them, used the boat to loot the ship's stores of coffee and bacon. At the end of the second trip the Germans were interrupted by the approach of a patrol vessel which rescued the bark's crew. The submarine was not seen again.

I. W. W. Leader Lynched at Butte, Mont.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 1.—Frank Little, member of the executive board of the Industrial Workers of the world, and prominent in labor troubles in Arizona, who recently referred in a speech here to United States soldiers as "Uncle Sam's scabs in uniform," was taken in a lodging house at 3:30 o'clock this morning by masked men and hanged to a railroad trestle on the outskirts of the city. His body was identified by Chief of Police Murphy, who cut it down at 8 o'clock this morning.

Since his arrival in Butte recently from Globe, Ariz., Little had made a number of speeches to strikers in all of which he had attacked the government and urged the men to shut down the mines of the Butte district. In two addresses he referred to United States soldiers as "Uncle Sam's scabs in uniform," and he is bitter in his denunciation of the government. His record was under investigation by the federal authorities whose attention has been called to his activities.

On the other hand, the report was current that Little was in the employ of a detective agency and one theory is that he was the victim of the radical element of which he appeared to be a member.

Soldier Bathing in Surf Loses His Life

Fort Stevens, Or., Aug. 1.—Walter B. Scott, of Portland, a member of the 8th company, Oregon coast artillery, was drowned in the surf here late yesterday, being carried away by the undertow. Four other men of the company, who attempted to rescue the drowning soldier, had a narrow escape from sharing his fate. They were: Sergeant William L. Miller, mechanic; Carl Pfeifer, acting corporal; Ralph Durgan and Private Albert E. Dugan. A strong wind and the outgoing tide made bathing hazardous when the members of the company entered the surf.

Airship Building Halted

Oakland, Calif., July 31.—Work relating to the manufacture of hydro-aeroplanes for the government was halted this morning when the 300 employees of the Hall-Scott Motor company of Berkeley walked out because of a technical dispute over union rules. Company officials said their refusal to discharge a Portuguese helper, who received \$2.50 a day, led to the trouble. Telegrams interchanging today between the company heads and Washington indicate that the government may take a hand in the affair.

No Oriental Labor to be Brought To The U. S.

Washington, Aug. 1.—Senator Chamberlain is advised relative to an inquiry submitted by W. E. Dillon, of Bend, that the department of labor does not contemplate the bringing of Orientals to this country for supplanting or supplementing white labor during the war.

Forest Fires Under Control

Dallas, Or., Aug. 2.—W. V. Fuller, supervising fire warden for this county reports that all the fires are under control, and he expects to have them entirely extinguished within a few days.

Plan to Postpone Open Deer Season Is Urged.

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 1.—Owing to the poisoning of so much live stock in Klamath county, the Klamath Lake Fire association is assisting the farmers in an effort to have the opening of deer hunting season delayed to September 1. By doing this, it would be easier to police the ranges and forests used for grazing purposes. After the opening of the hunting season the woods are filled with hunters and to demand satisfactory explanation of all would require more men, but with the season delayed all persons found in the timber and on the ranges can be held to account and questioned by the rangers.

New Force of Guards On Southern Oregon Tunnels.

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 2.—Guards were placed at all the railroad bridges throughout Southern Oregon yesterday. Most of the tunnels were already provided local police. A shortage of men is reported for the jobs, but as the work is easy, it is thought that all places will be filled soon.

Seattle Cars Back on Runs

Seattle, Aug. 2.—Normal street car service was restored in Seattle this morning, after a 16-day interruption due to the strike of the 1600 motormen and conductors of the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power company for the right to join a national union. The men won this point, but conceded the open shop. The strikers went to the barns for work this morning as though there had not been a moment's disturbance of their relations with the company.

Flanders Battle May Be Biggest of The War.

Paris, Aug. 1.—The battle of Flanders, which began with the French and British advance yesterday, it is believed, will be the biggest of the war, and may last for weeks or months. The results already achieved lead military observers to say that it is not too much to hope that the Germans may soon be cleared out of French and Belgian Flanders.

After the magnificent success of the French and British in Belgium yesterday, the entente troops in a torrential rainstorm consolidated the positions which they had captured, the war office announced today.

New Dog License Held Invalid

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 2.—The new dog law, passed by the last legislature to regulate and license dogs in the country districts, was held to be unconstitutional yesterday afternoon by Judge J. W. Hamilton of this city, in a suit brought by Roy Bellows, a merchant.

The law has caused the resignation of about one-third of the constables in this county, who quit rather than enforce the law.

The act was held to be against public policy and against the constitution, inasmuch as all the dogs in the state were not subject to the same license. It is also classed as freak legislation. It provides a tax of \$1.50 on male dogs and \$3.50 on females in certain counties and makes the constables liable for its enforcement and requires them to catch the dogs.

Retail Delivery to be Cut Down

Portland, Aug. 2.—Following the pace set in other large cities, the retail merchants of Portland will put into effect soon the custom of making only one free delivery of purchases a day. This plan of eliminating economic wastefulness and conserving man power during the war period has been recommended by the national council of defense and was adopted at a meeting of retailers yesterday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce. All department stores are included in the compact, which tends to check the advancing costs of commodities, merchants declare.

Brown Decides Who Are State's Pioneers.

Salem, Oregon, Aug. 2.—A pioneer within the meaning of the game laws of the state is a person who has either immigrated to Oregon or was born within its boundaries prior to December 31, 1859, according to an opinion rendered by Attorney General Brown. The game laws relieve soldiers, sailors, and pioneers of the financial burden of obtaining fishing and hunting licenses, and the question arose as to who were the pioneers.

LOOK TO U. S. FOR SHIPS

To Defeat U-Boat Campaign, America Must Equal The British Yards.

London, July 29.—The Observer in an article arguing that the western allies, even without Russia, are more powerful than the central powers, says: "The real crux of the whole war is to provide ships for American requirements. We refuse for a single moment to believe that the United States will fail to rise to the crisis. The cause needs every single ton of maritime carrying power that the United States can muster or launch later.

No possible shipbuilding effort in this country alone can provide the huge additional tonnage demanded by coming American requirements. To get fairly ahead of the submarines, the United States must launch at least the same amount tonnage as that mentioned by Lloyd-George in Paris as Great Britain's output for next year, namely 4,000,000 tons, and that within the same time."

Church Services In Jail Are Opposed by I. W. W.

North Yakima, Wash., July 30.—A written protest signed by 35 of the 72 prisoners in the county jail, against the holding of any sort of religious services in the jail while they are there was presented to the sheriff Saturday evening. It has been the custom of the sheriff to allow the Salvation Army or some other organization to hold service in the jail on Sunday afternoon, and the protest will go unheeded. It is stated by the men that "the holding of a religious service Sunday afternoon inconveniences us and we have decided we don't need religion." Most of the men are I. W. W. or alleged shirkers from army registration, while a few are alien enemies.

U. S. Warships Drive U-Boats Under Water

American Naval Base in British Waters, July 31.—American torpedo boat destroyers were reported today to have engaged two hostile submarines, causing them to submerge without shooting. One of the U-boats had just sunk a steamer and the other was attacking a merchantman.

Bad Check Operator and I. W. W. put in Quarry

Centralia, Wash., July 31.—E. D. Morrison, sentenced by Justice Charles H. Ross to a term of 40 days in the Hotel Wilson, will serve his sentence at the Meskill rock quarry. W. J. Dunn, an I. W. W. taken from a train at Vader last week, will also serve 60 days on the rock pile.

Bone Dry Law Goes Into Effect In Utah.

Salt Lake City, Aug. 1.—The bone dry prohibition law went into effect in Utah at midnight. The new law is one of the most drastic adopted by any state in the United States and carries penalties for the sale, giving away or possession of intoxicating liquors.

Any person who drinks in a public place, on the streets, or is intoxicated, will be deemed guilty of misdemeanor. Physicians cannot prescribe liquor for beverage purposes.

Prohibition Wins, 65 to 20.

Washington, Aug. 1.—A resolution for submission to the states of a prohibition amendment to the federal constitution was adopted late today by the senate.

The vote was 65 to 20, eight more than the necessary two-thirds.

As adopted the resolution contains a provision that the states must be asked to ratify the amendment within six years. The house has still to act on the resolution.
