RUSSIAN TROOPS IN RETREAT

Two Million Men Moving Rearwards Position Is Critical.

London, July 31.—A dispatch to the Post from Petrograd referring to the Russian retreat, in Galicia says it is conservatively estimated that more than 2,000,000 Russian troops are steadily marching rearward. These constitute the 11th and 7th armies and their reserves.

The 8th army, which is largely cavalry and not included in the foregoing figures, also is retreating, and its position, says the correspondent, is extremely critical. The Germans are straining every effort to capture it while following up the Eleventh and Seventh armies, and it looks as if the Eight army might be caught in a bag.

A dispatch to the Times from the headquarters of the Russian army says the situation is more hopeful. Panics among the retreaters are suppressed ruthlessly. Three divisions of cavalry have taken positions across the whole front of retreat.

Deserters are shot and attempts to spread panic are suppressed by prompt executions. Deserters, spies and agitators who enjoyed complete immunity under the committee system he dead on the highways. A paper pinned on the corpses reads: "Here lies a traitor to his country."

Red badges and other symbols which accompanied the demoralization have almost disappeared.

Wormy Apples Plentiful.

Oregon Agricultural College Station, Corvallis, Aug. 3.—A heavy crop of wormy apples in the average valley orchard has been found in a recent survey. The early brood has already done its work but it is the new crop of worms that will sting the fruit hardest during August and September unless it is controlled. It is this generation of worms that increases the loss to growers and now is the time to spray for them.

From Corvallis south, spray August 1 to 6. From Corvallis north, August 4 to 8. Use the arsenical solution applied as a fine misty spray, making every effort to cover the entire surface of the fruit. Evidence now indicates, concludes Prof. A. L. Lovett, O. A. C. entomologist, that a second application about August 25 to September 5 will be highly advisable.

It is to be hoped that the prohibition move in Washington doesn't portend a return to grape-juice diplomacy.

Moving Picture Censors.

The national board of review of motion pictures is made up entirely of unpaid workers, including a general committee of thirty-five members, self-perpetuating, from which is selected an executive committee, which, in turn, elects members of the review committee. This latter committee is divided into sections, which attend from twenty-five to thirty picture reviews weekly. The general committee is a court of appeal for any pictures which may be held for further consideration. It was formed in 1909 and has always been gladly recognized by the manufacturers, exhibitors and producers. Last year it caused to be eliminated 14,399 feet of objectionable films. Among those on the general committee are: P. F. Jerome, business bureau of the International committee of New York; Dr. Charles S. Macfarland, general secretary of Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.—Film Fun.

Floating Drydocks.

Our largest floating dock is the Dewey, at the Olonapo naval station, in the Philippine Islands. Floating drydocks are so arranged as to lift a big battleship bodily from the water. When it is desired to dock a vessel the floating dock is sunk by admitting water to it, and the ship is floated over it. When the ship is in the proper place over the dock the water is pumped out, and it rises, lifting the ship with it. When it is desired to refloat the ship the dock is sunk again by admitting water, and the ship is hauled off. There are side walls to the dock which remain partly above water. In these are located the pumping machinery, and on them the docking gangs work. The Dewey is in three sections, of which the two small end sections lift the large central section and are themselves lifted by it.

Goethals Saw the Point.

Shortly after our war with Germany was started R. J. McBride of Beaumont was awarded a big contract for the construction of wooden ships for our government. The fact that McBride's firm had never engaged in shipbuilding promised to militate against his getting a contract, and the lack of practical experience was mentioned during his conference with General Goethals.

"Your firm has never constructed ships," said the general.

"No, sir."

"Well?" pressed the government's representative.

"General, you built the Panama canal," replied McBride.

"So they say," was the answer.

"Did you ever build a canal before?" General Goethals saw the point.—Dallas News.

Carnations and Rats.

Not long ago the basement of a department store in San Diego, Cal., received a sudden influx of rats. Traps, however baited, tempted but few, and other methods of riddance tried seemed of little avail. About this time the janitor noticed that old carnations thrown into the rubbish disappeared overnight. He put two and two together and began baiting traps with carnations. Every trap added to the fatalities in the rodent kingdom.

The city health department then took it up and has been achieving very satisfactory results therefrom. The odor of the flower seems to attract rats from some considerable distance. The variation of color apparently making no difference.—American City.

A Storm That Made a Record.

The most violent storm that ever ravaged England occurred Nov. 26 and 27, 1703. The loss in London alone was \$10,000,000. Eight thousand people were drowned in the floods. Twelve warships, with more than 1,800 men on board, were lost. Trees were uprooted—1,700 of them in Kent. Eddy-stone lighthouse was destroyed, and Winstanley, its contriver, was killed with several others.

CAN PEAS AND BEANS

Beans and Peas Are Easily Canned at Home.

Housekeepers can easily can surplus green peas and snap beans, which are beginning to appear in home gardens in many sections. The seasons has been unusually good for peas, and home gardeners in many localities are reporting unexpectedly heavy yields. Either of these products really can be canned with no other home equipment than jars or cans and a wash boiler fitted with a false bottom of slats to keep the jars from resting on the bottom.

Do not try to can peas or beans that have been long off the vines—the fresher the vegetables the better the product.

Shell peas; in case of beans, string and cut them as for cooking.

Put the prepared vegetables in a cheesecloth bag or colander and blanch in live steam from boiling water for from 5 to 10 minutes.

Next dip the blanched product quickly in cold water and remove it almost immediately.

Pack the product immediately into hot glass jars or tin cans.

Fill the containers completely with boiling water to which has been added one level teaspoonful of salt per quart. Place rubber rings on jars and screw tops almost, but not completely, tight. The water in the boiler will not enter these partially closed jars. Seal tin cans completely.

Put the jars or cans in boiling water in the wash boiler so that the tops are partly or wholly covered. Sterilize for 180 minutes in the boiling water, counting from the time the water begins to boil again.

Wax and string beans as well as young, tender peas may be sterilized in 120 minutes.

Remove jars from boiler or sterilizer tighten covers, invert to cool and test joints for leakage. Examine cans for leaks. Even the slightest leak if not closed completely at once, means that the product in all probability will not keep.

Do not place glass jars to cool in a draft, which is liable to cause them to crack. Wrap jars in paper to prevent blanching, and store in a cool place.

If peas are roughly handled in blanching or cold dipping, or split or broken peas are not removed before packing, the liquid in the jars may have a slightly clouded appearance. If sterilizing has been properly done, cloudiness is no evidence that the product has spoiled.

Officials Overwork The Mails

While proposing to increase newspaper postage, the mails continue to be loaded down by the congressional franking privilege, and the press bureaus of all the departments.

Here is the morning mail with press matter in twelve large envelopes, all without postage, most of them stamped "letter mail," and all asking space of the newspapers to boost what?

Another Treasury department bond issue, the bureau of Entomology, (bugology,) department of Agriculture on cold storage of potatoes, (the game of the middleman,) and one boosting the national parks.

Dept. of Commerce sends us ten sheets on exports to Russia, Geological Survey boosts oil production while the legal department prosecutes drilling for oil, while another tells us how high coal may go.

Then one bulletin tells how to hold cotton for the highest price and another tells us how we must exterminate the pink boll worm to win the European war—all information to help cotton speculators get wiser.

The Bureau of Markets is given \$2,000,000 merely for a starter, the emergency extension is given \$2,522,000 for the home demonstration system, and we are swamped with information and expenses soar and soar.

The publisher's principal business is opening deadhead mail that is sent out from an army of publicity officials which no one prints and no one reads, and the business man and private citizen pay the bill.
