TROOP MOVEMENT CHANGES

Only 5 Per Cent Sept. 5.
Second Quota Called Sep. 19

Washington, Aug. 29.—In a letter to Secretary Baker, quoted by General Crowder, President Wilson states his opinion that the regulations directing local boards "to establish the fact of dependents in addition to the fact of marriage ought not to be abrogated." This leaves the regulations as they are and the supplementary statement is designed merely to make the application of the rules uniform among all boards.

While the statement regarding married men was in preparation new orders were issued, changing entirely the mobilization arrangements previously made. Congestion of railroad traffic and the necessity of making better provision for the reception of the men at the cantonments dictated the changes. Under the new orders 5 per cent of the drafted, preferably the men with military experience, from each local area will be started forward to the camps September 5, instead of 30 per cent.

They will go in five daily detachments of equal size and form skeleton company organizations and set up a going concern into which the remainder of the total quota can be absorbed without confusion as they reach the cantonments.

The next 40 per cent of the quota will go forward September 19, when the second 30 per cent originally was scheduled to go; a second 40 per cent will go forward October instead of the third 30 per cent, and the remaining 15 per cent will be called as soon thereafter as practicable.

Advertising May Be Paid

Washington, Aug. 27.—Senator McNary today in conference with Secretary McAdoo recommended that the Treasury Department in floating the next liberty loan pay the newspapers for the advertising. He pointed to the free advertising furnished on the first loan, and insisted that it would be an imposition on the press generally to supply the government free of cost accommodation which was valuable to the publishers. Secretary McAdoo said the next bond issue will not be floated until November, and meantime he will consider the Senator's recommendation.



News Snapshots Of the Week

The return of Ellhu Root and the other members of the American mission to Russia gave us an insight into Russia's strength; Root reported the republic safe if the present government received our wholehearted support. Selecting his new cabinet, Dr. Georg Michaelis, German chancellor, named Dr. von Kuhlmann as foreign minister, while Dr. Karl Helfferich, vice chancellor, was the only one of the old cabinet to remain. Liberals in Germany first saw no battle in the change. Canadians advanced on Lens, the German stronghold in France; Sir Arthur Currie has now become commander of all the Canadian forces. Part of America's draft army will be in camp by Sept. 1; identification disks will be worn by all our soldiers in the future. Fighting for the possession of her son, Mrs. John L. De Saules, wife of the former Yale football star, shot her husband and is now in jail in Mineola, N. Y.; Mrs. De Saules is a Chilean heiress, and it is claimed millions will be spent for her defense if necessary; she was divorced from De Saules.

Attorney Cited For Contempt
Of Court

Portland, Aug. 27.—On complaint of
Assistant United States Attorney
Goldstein, Norman Richards, a local
attorney, has been ordered to appear
in federal court tomorrow to show
why he should not be punished for con-
tempt of the United States district
court.

In the petition which Goldstein pre-
sented to Judge Wolverton this morn-
ing it is alleged that Richards attempt-
ed to interfere with witnesses before
the federal grand jury in the White
slave case against Robert Wright a
citizen of Washington state, which is
being investigated. It is asserted that
Richards tried to persuade witnesses not
to testify before the grand jury.

Polk County Observer Is Sold
To Portland man

Dallas, Or., Aug. 27.—The Polk
County Observer, newspaper published
in this city was sold Saturday to H. W.
Southard, of Portland, a newspaper
man of many years experience. H. W.
Brins, the retiring editor, who has
conducted the paper for the past year
was granted a second lieutenant's
commission in the United States army
and has been ordered to American
Lake.

Two Men Injured When Auto
Truck Turns Turtle

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 27.—F. W. Kafta,
aged 81, was seriously injured yester-
day on Roberts mountain and his son,
E. L. Kafta, was badly injured, when
their heavy auto truck turned turtle on
the south side of the mountain. The
men came from Coburg, and were on
their way to San Diego.

75,000 CHILDREN FACE STARVATION

Horrible Condition In Turk-
ish Provinces Reported
By Missionaries

New York, Aug. 27.—More than
50,000 children under 12 years of age,
all dependent on outside relief for
necessities of life, are in Lebanon,
and an additional 25,000 orphans are in
Syria, not including Palestine, accord-
ing to reports of missionaries from
the near East who recently arrived
here. It was asserted by the mission-
aries that it was doubtful whether
many of these children could survive
the coming winter, if relief does not
reach them in a more substantial form
than heretofore.

In many instances, the missionaries
said, little children scarcely old enough
to feed themselves were found by
relief workers living absolutely alone,
begging for food to keep them alive
and failing in that, subsisting on grass.
The majority of these were girls who
had greater powers of resistance or to
having been fed by their brothers who
starved.

New State Guard Company
Receives Army Rifles

Centralia, Wash., Aug. 27.—A special
drill at the armory on Saturday night
was held by company G, 3d provisional
regiment, Washington state guard, at
which the arms delivered to the com-
pany by the state were distributed
among the men and used for the first
time. The uniforms for which the
men have been measured are expected
to arrive at any time. There are 15
carbines and 75 rifles in the consign-
ment received by the company.

Boy of 15 Shoots And Kills
Brother Aged 6

Bellingham, Wash., Aug. 27.—
Manon Iverson, aged 6 years, was
shot and instantly killed by his own
brother Harry, aged 15, while the two
were playing in their father's barn at
Everson yesterday. The boys had
found the rifle which caused the
tragedy in the barn.

American Flier Killed In France

Washington, Aug. 27.—The first
death of an American naval flier at
the French front was announced here
today in official dispatches to the navy
department. He was George Herbert
Manley, a machinist's mate in the
naval aeronautical corps, and was killed
in an airplane accident, the nature of
which was not described. Manley was
a son of Herbert Manley of Maplewood
N. Y.

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
