Held Tuesday Night. Marshal Resigns, Joe Wetterer Appointed To Position

The regular monthly business meeting of the city dads was held Tuesday. Mayor and all councilmen present. City Recorder absent. D. W. Bagshaw presented a certificate of appointment as deputy recorder, which with his oath of office was ordered filed with treasurer.

The report of Treasurer Dox for period from March 13, 1917, to Aug. 7, 1917, was presented and ordered filed.

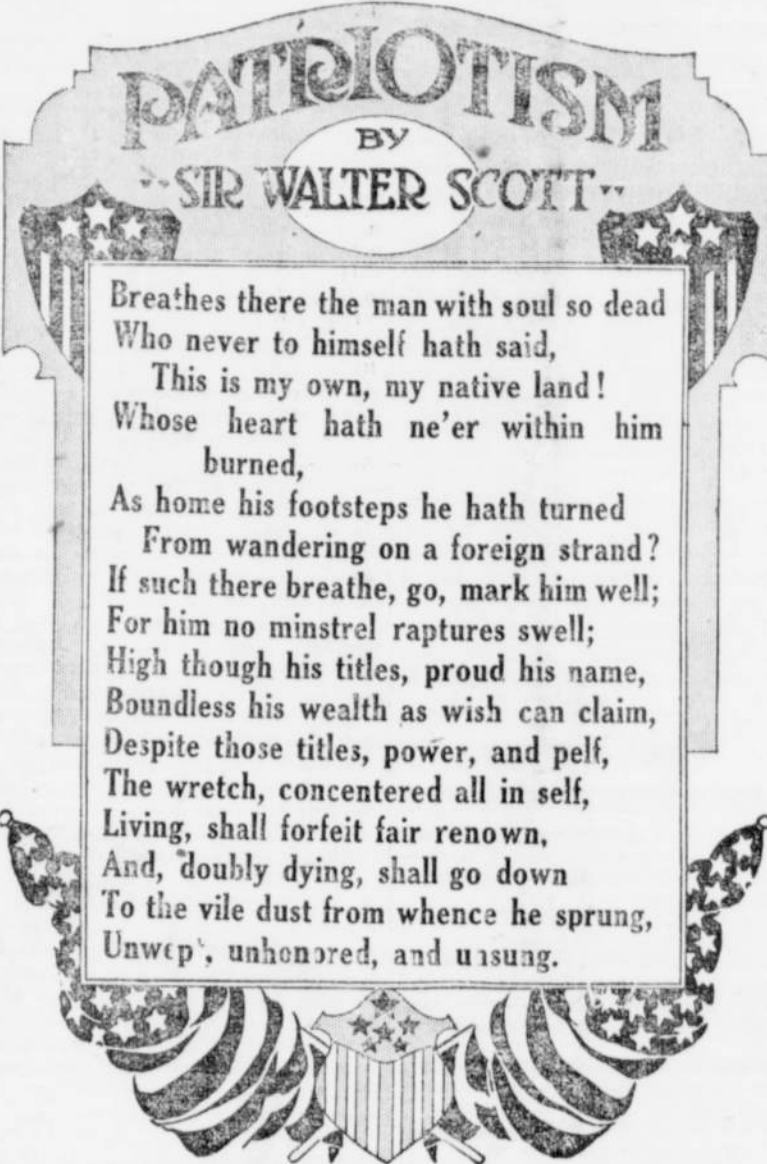
A complaint was made regarding odors from a barn yard in the eastern end of town and the chairman of the Health committee was instructed to investigate and report.

The matter of the marshal's resignation was discussed at some length and on motion the resignation was accepted; Joe Wetterer was chosen to fill the vacancy for the balance of the term at \$70 per month.

Undertakers Refuse To Sell Burial Lot

Baker, Or., Sept. 3.—Welsh & Co., local undertakers, refused to sell a burial lot in a cemetery owned by them to Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Funk, because the funeral arrangements had been with a rival undertaker when the Funk's daughter Elvira, aged 4, died on Friday night, it is claimed, and the body is being held at the home of the parents until the father can appeal to the courts for redress. The funeral was scheduled for Sunday, Welsh & Co. are said to have decided that unless they are employed for funerals they will refuse to sell lots in their cemetery.

CAMP PAYROLL IS HUGE

Government Distributes \$600,000 At American Lake

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 1.—(Special)—Soldiers and civilians alike shared in the great payroll at Camp Lewis today, when \$600,000 was distributed by the Government and building contractors. Half of this went to the approximately 10,000 workmen helping to construct the military city in record time. The remainder was paid to the 1400 officers who came from the Presidio. Some will get a full month's pay and some that portion of the month's pay since they left the Presidio. Four thousand enlisted men at Camp Murray also received pay. This is the largest civilian payroll to date.

The Milwaukee Railroad let a contract today to C. Matson & Sons, Tacoma contractors, to grade five and one half miles of right of way from Glendale, on the Tacoma Eastern to Camp Lewis, and will build a line there to give service to the cantonment. The extension will cost \$60,000.

Safety Deposit Boxes Robbed

The Bank of Jacksonville was entered by burglars some time Saturday night or Sunday morning. They effected an entrance through a rear door and by drilling two holes through the steel vault door they secured admission to the vault where they proceeded to wreck the deposit boxes rented to the patrons of the bank.

Deeds, bonds, county warrants and other papers were thrown on the floor in a mixed assortment. About \$500 cash, several watches, some diamond rings and other jewelry valued at \$1500, which were stored in the boxes, were taken. Some silver coin amounting to \$100, the property of the bank and which had been left out of the safe was also taken. The bank safe which stands inside the vault was not disturbed being evidently too tough a proposition for the burglars to tackle. The bank was protected by burglar insurance which covers all loss sustained by the bank.

Two carpenter's chisels left by the burglars are the only clues to the identity of the party or parties.

Ford Gives Red Cross Half Million

Washington, Sept. 1.—A gift from the Ford Motor Company of \$500,000 to the Red Cross was announced today by the War Council, in the form of a credit on the Ford factories for half a million dollars worth of automobiles, ambulances, parts, etc., as the Red Cross may designate.

Some Recent Happenings In Various Parts of Oregon

Boy Pleads Guilty And Goes To Reform School

Canyonville, Or., Sept. 4.—Fay Slade, arrested for stealing numerous articles from a house here, appeared before justice of the Peace McGilvary and pleaded guilty to the charge. Everything of value was recovered, while several articles of little or no value had been thrown away. The lad who is 18, was sentenced to the Oregon Reform school to serve until he is 21 years old.

Herd Of Hogs Brings Good Price To Grower

Carlton, Or., Sept. 4.—F. J. Canfield delivered 85 head of hogs to George Zimmerman here yesterday, for which he received a total of \$2035. The average weight of the hogs was 179 lbs. All were of Mr. Canfield's own raising and they were raised on clover and finished with grain.

Railroad In Clackamas County To Be Extended

Salem, Or., Sept. 4.—Advices have been received by the public service commission that the Portland & Oregon City railway contemplated extending its line from Baker ridge to Viola, in Clackamas County. The company asks that the commission pass on a number of crossings, necessary in the extension of the road.

Irrigation Ditch Polluted

Bend, Or., Sept. 1.—Pleading guilty to the charge of polluting an irrigation ditch John Marsh, John Harper, A. Harper, Charles Anderson, who were arrested yesterday afternoon, were each fined \$10 and costs in the local Justice Court. The charge against the men was that a sheepherder in their employ let sheep lie in the water, causing a severe epidemic of dysentery and death among users of the water.

Boy Burglar Shows Look To Canyonville officer

Canyonville, Or., Sept. 3.—A boy giving his name as Fay Slade and his age as 18, was arrested near here yesterday, charged with burglary and the theft of articles valued at about \$30. He confessed and took Deputy Sheriff Hopkins to the point where the goods was hidden. Slade admits having been in the Washington State Reform school. He had letters from the probation officer at Portland.

Hop Harvest Begins in Polk County

Independence, Or., Sept. 3.—Hundreds of hop pickers are arriving here daily, mostly women and children. No scarcity of labor is expected, judging from the number of pickers appearing. There will be few men in the yards this year.

Picking will commence in all yards this week. Several hundred acres of untrained and uncultivated hops will be picked this year. As these hops are mostly on the ground, and the yield is small, the pickers will receive \$1 to \$1.25 per hundred pounds for this work.

Grain Must Be Inspected

Salem, Or., Sept. 4.—(Special)—All grain coming into a class B terminal warehouse must be graded by the grain inspection department, whether "Not for terminal weight and grade" or not so marked. This was the opinion furnished the Public Service by Attorney-General Brown.

Candles Light 3 Towns

Baker, Or., Sept. 4.—(Special)—John Day, Prairie City and Canyon City are without lights because of a breakdown in the power plant at Prairie City. The big dredge on Canyon Creek, which has been running day and night with three crews of men, is shut down until repairs are made, which will be perhaps 10 days.

In the meantime these three towns are using candles and kerosene.
