DIPPING SEED POTA-TOES INCREASE YIELD

Rotation, Selection and Disinfection of Seed, Are Essential Factors.

All of these are essential to control careful attention just now is that of land divisions: seed treatment, described as follows by the O. A. C. Plant Pathologists: Baker Take four ounces of mercuric chloride, Benton powdered or chrystalline, (which may be bought at the local drug store) and dissolve it in one quart of hot water. Cloumbia Add enough water to make 30 gallons. Coos Barrels, wooden tubs or concrete ves- Crook sels may be used, since the disinfect- Curry ant corrodes metals and soon loses strength in metal receptacles.

After sorting and cleaning the potatoes, put the uncut tubers in sacks or Grant crates and immerse them in the solution, or pour them loose into it, for 11/2 hours. Remove, and spread the seed or drain the sacks, after which Jefferson the tubers may be cut. A fresh solu- Josephine tion is required after every fourth

American Troops Are Rushed To Europe.

Washington, April 9-Announcement has been officially made here that American troops already are being rushed to Europe in increased numbers as under the speed up measures decided on when the battle of Ficardy began. No details of the movement were given by Acting Secretary of War Crowell, who gave out the information. American forces were to be brigaded with British troops in order to basten

American participation in the war. Officials explained that the process to be followed was similar to that adopted in placing American troops in the front lines with the French for training. It has been estimated that 30 days' training of this character with Ameri-
