May Farther Curtail

Auto Manufacture.

Washington, April 23—A further curtailment of the manufacture of pleasure automobiles was indicated today as the outcome of a conference held by the fuel administration and the war industries board with representatives of the automobile industry. The curtailment, if made effective, would restrict the manufacture of pleasure cars to about 25 per cent of the normal production. A 30 per cent reduction already has been made operative.

40 Trains Of Wounded

Reach Brussels Daily.

Amsterdam, April 22—The streams of wounded Germans from France and Flanders, says the frontier correspondent of the Telegraaf, continue so great that all the hospitals, monasteries, convents and schools not only in Brussels, but in many towns, are filled to overflowing. The Germans have even requisitioned private houses for hospitals.

Forty ambulance trains entered Brussels daily last week. Many of them were made up of cattle cars in which were litters of straw for the wounded men.

Book For Settlers Issued.

Seventy-five per cent of the claims are listed as good for grazing or rocky and worthless. The amount of timber on each claim, the nearest town and the distance to a wagon and railroad are also given as to each claim.
