"There is but one standard for measuring a woman in this new day of war. That is dependability. The woman who can be depended upon is the one we want. The one who cannot be counted upon is the one who will be dropped forever. A professional spirit is the need of American women, who have been parasitic for too long. We must stop taking and give. Eight hours a day is a short day for this great work we have before us. Two or three hours a day to the Red Cross is not enough for

any woman to give as her war work. "We must get as our personal point of view the realization that we cannot have our cake and eat it too. We must ask ourselves, in this war of equipment rather than men, who must go without if we have the things we have been accustomed to. Business and pleasure cannot go on as usual if we are successfully to conduct this tremendous new business of war.

"We have forgotten, when we are buying new clothes and eating the wheat and sweets that we want and riding in our motor cars, that we are hampering the Government. We are standing in the way of the Government's business which is war.
