Two Allied Destroyers

Defeat Five Austrians

London, April 29—In the engagement of allied and Austrian light sea forces in the Adriatic on April 22, the British lost seven men killed and 19 wounded, the admiralty reports. Two British destroyers which for a time fought five Austrian destroyers, were only slightly damaged.

The official Austrian account of the engagement, issued yesterday, said one British destroyer was damaged seriously.

Tunnel On Logging Railroad Collapses.

Clatskanie, Or., April 29—Approximately 1700 men were thrown out of work here when the big tunnel on the Kerry logging railroad caved in here Thursday. This tunnel was one of the largest in the state, being 1890 feet long, and 300 feet collapsed. The logging railroad of the Kerry Timber company at Kerry passes the logs from eight logging camps and as the camps have no way of disposing of their logs they will have to shut down. It is estimated that it will require at least one month to repair the damage, working day and night. The cause of the collapse is blamed on weak bracing. It is held to be almost impossible to build the railroad over the mountain.

Curry County's Quota Exceeded Six Times.

Gold Beach, Or., April 29—Gold Beach, the county seat of Curry county, has subscribed over six times the amount of its quota in the Third Liberty Loan drive. In the preceding drives Curry county was not organized as a separate unit, but was hitched on to Coos county, and as a result Curry county has been at the bottom of the list in subscriptions, but this time, under a separate organization in charge of local men who are familiar with conditions, the entire county has responded with six times the quota allotted.
