UNITED STATES SENATOR

CHARLES L. McNARY



Because United States Senator Charles L. McNary has made good he should be nominated to succeed himself in the Republican Primary, May 17th.

From the day he became Senator he has loyally championed the prosecution of the war, and during his term of office has accomplished more for Oregon than any other member in Congress in a like period.

Senator McNary has procured: Government contracts for the first time in the State's history for such Oregon products as prunes, dehydrated potatoes and vegetables.

Large contracts for army clothing for Oregon factories, shipbuilding yards and lumbering industry.

Favorable action by the senate committee on irrigation on a bill providing for the government marketing of district irrigation bonds, thereby supplying funds for irrigation district projects.

Favorable action from same committee on a bill authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to accept irrigation or district drainage bonds and exchange them with the Secretary of Treasury for certificates of indebtedness, thereby providing funds for legitimate projects.

Senator McNary is working for: Prompt payment of allotments to dependent relatives of soldiers and sailors.

For the construction of a coast military highway at government expense.

A comprehensive plan for the utilization of the water resources of Oregon.

Senator McNary was born on a farm in Oregon; reared in the Baptist Church; educated in the public schools; worked his way through Stanford University; is a lawyer and farmer and has been a life-long Republican. He was formerly a Justice of the Supreme Court and later chairman of the State Republican Central Committee.

Space forbids further enumeration of the vast amount of work Senator McNary has done for Oregon, but anyone will realize from the foregoing the Senator has displayed truly remarkable ability, coupled with extraordinary diligence and energy. His native State can best show its appreciation of his faithful and efficient services by nominating and electing him.

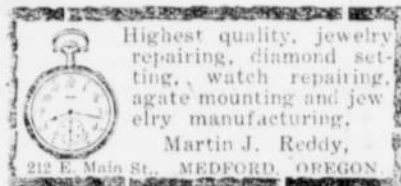

PUT IRON IN OUR SOULS:

The Spirit of the First Line Trenches Needed in Loan Drive.

"A little more iron in our souls," was the appeal made by Lyle Young in Des Moines recently, "a little more of the spirit of our soldiers, a stimulus that will give us a relentless and undying determination to wipe the Hohenzollern monster from the face of the earth."

American people are noted for their complacency, their seeming willingness to enjoy the fruits of their prosperity, leaving to others the task of fighting their war for them. They do not stop to realize the enormity of Germany's crime and the intense seriousness of the present world war of self-preservation, the supreme test of our manhood and our civilization.

Our soldiers are doing their part, but says Mr. Young, "how pitiful are Red Cross contributions, Liberty Bonds and Y. M. C. A. gifts compared with the sacrifices and sufferings of our soldiers. We have comfort, happiness, the ties and affections of home. But they, like immortal Alan Seeger, have their rendezvous with death."

"We are proud," he continues, "that America has met her duty, true to her best traditions. And may God grant that those of us at home fail not in one single obligation to our soldiers, to our Allies, to our country!"
