Relief Planned for Ex-Soldiers.
Olympia, Wash., Jan. 20.—Senator G. R. Lamping, Seattle, Republican, has announced he intends to introduce into the state senate here a bill directing the appropriation by the state of \$2,500,000 for the relief of returned soldiers and sailors.
Needy soldiers, who are residents of Washington, will receive \$10 a month for every month of service providing they have served two months, if the bill is passed.

French Official Fined For Bringing Liquor.
Portland, Jan. 20.—E. C. Genereaux who represents the French Government in the supervision of vessels being built here for that republic, was fined \$250 by Federal Judge Wolverson this morning for bringing from San Francisco to Portland for his own use two quarts of wine, 7/8 quarts of whiskey and one quart of apricot brandy.
L. J. Barker, arrested coincidentally with Genereaux for a similar offense, also was fined \$250. Barker carried a satchel containing four quarts of whiskey, one quart of sherry and one quart of port. Both fines were paid.

Plot to Kill Peace Delegates Reported.

Geneva, Jan. 20.—Several German and Russian Bolsheviks have been arrested by the Lausanne police. It is said they were bearing false passports and were on their way to Paris. The Gazette of Lausanne says:
"The Bolsheviks under arrest plotted against the lives of Premier Clemenceau, President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George. The plot was backed by German gold."

Merchant Bar.

Merchant bar, or merchant iron, is the bar iron which has been finished by passing through the merchant rolls. Puddled bars are worked into merchant iron or merchant bar by being cut into pieces of suitable length, which are then piled in packets, heated into welding heat, and then hammered into bars of suitable shape to put on the market. The amount of labor bestowed on this process depends on the quality of the iron it is desired to produce. Puddled bars, which have been rolled a second time are called "No. 2," and this is usually designated as "merchant bar." It is the lowest quality of iron available for the smith's general use. If piled and rolled again the product is called "No. 3." Another reputation of the process furnishes an article known as "best-best," and still another gives "trouble-best."

Boy's Instinct True.

"Historian of the sky" was the title bestowed on Angelo Secchi, the famous Italian astronomer. A quaint little anecdote is told of him at the time of his first visit to London. Not knowing English, he wondered how he should find his way about, and confided his doubts to his young companion, an Italian boy of fifteen. Finally they decided that the best plan would be to go and look for an Italian. "Our difficulties will then be met," said Secchi, and went straight for the British museum. Entering the reading room, he looked rapidly at the readers and unhesitatingly accosted one of them with, "Bon giorno! Lei e' italiano!" He was not mistaken, and the Italian not only directed Secchi where he wished to go, but became his host during his stay in the British capital.

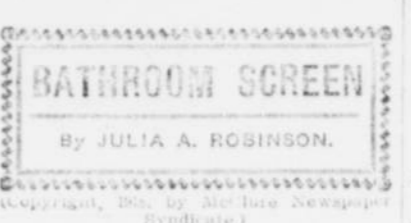

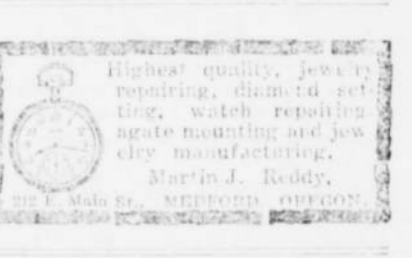
