POOR FINANCE TO LET BANKS TAKE V. LOAN

Just about two years ago we began to make war and stopped making a lot of other things or made these other things only in limited supply. Railway construction came to a dead stop. Equipment was worn out faster than it was replaced. All over the country building operations were suspended. In the North Atlantic states alone the deficiency in building is estimated by the Department of Labor to exceed \$500,000,000. If the situation all over the country is comparable to this, the accumulated need for construction now exceeds two billion dollars. Through a wide range of manufactures from automobiles to chewing gum curtailment was the order of the day until now we face a deficiency in numerous commodities of customary use.

The emergency which led to curtailment is happily past. The interest of all classes of people requires the quickest possible resumption of normal activity. Consumers want the goods, returning soldiers need the employment. The heavy war taxes call for correspondingly large production, while European reconstruction will open the way for exports.

This resumption of enterprise, if we embark upon it as we should, will require bank loans on a tremendous scale. The high wages and high cost of materials will necessitate advances proportionately greater than in the past. To be available for this purpose, the funds of the banks must not be absorbed by government requirements. The necessity for a wide public participation in the Victory Liberty loan is even greater than it was in the case of earlier loans when curtailment of industry diminished the needs of private business.

If the banks are compelled to carry the government, they cannot at the same time carry their customers. For every billion dollars worth of bonds lent on the hands of the banks there will be just a billion less for the revival of industry and the employment of labor.

THE ACID TEST

Provost Marshal-General Crowder's report of the work of mobilizing the man-power of the nation under the Selective Draft Act disclosed the reason why America was able to produce such a tremendous quantity of foodstuff despite the drain upon the labor of the country by the operation of the draft. The reason was that sixty-five per cent of the farm labor of the country registered for military service was given deferred classification upon agricultural grounds.

Saving the possible exception of shipyard workers no other single industry was given such consideration as was the pursuit of farming and no class of producers was treated more fairly than the farmers. This was right and just, yet to the credit of the government.

The war is over as far as the fighting is concerned and the government turns to the people to settle up the bills incurred in ending it. It expects the farmer, individually and as a class, to retaliate with the "square deal."

The Victory Liberty Loan—the last of the Liberty Loans—is coming next month. It is going to catch the farmer at the wrong season. That is good.

VICTORY LOAN QUOTA NOT TO HINGE ON W. S. S.

Failure of Some Districts to Reapportion Causes Change in Plans

Victory Liberty Loan quotas will not be affected by Thrift Stamp sales as planned by the Treasury Department the first of the year. It was announced last January by Lewis B. Franklin, director of war savings, that whenever Thrift Stamp quotas were exceeded the amount of over-subscription would be taken from the coming loan quota and that if the Thrift Stamp quotas were not reached the deficiency would be added to the loan quota.

Governor James K. Lynch of the Federal Reserve Bank has just received a telegram from Washington advising that the plan to adjust Victory Loan quotas in accordance with the sale of War Savings Stamps has been abandoned. The reason given was that some of the Federal Reserve Districts were not reapportioning Thrift Stamp quotas.

GEN. PERSHING COMMENDS AID RENDERED ARMY

Post Exchanges Overseas Are Taken Over by the Military Authorities

Asserting that the valuable aid rendered by the war service of the Y. M. C. A. had been a large factor in the final great accomplishments of the American army, General Pershing, in a communication to E. C. Carter, in charge of association operations with the American Expeditionary Force, pays a splendid tribute to the work which this agency accomplished under extreme difficulties and handicaps.

"The Y. M. C. A. served the army better than could have been expected," says General Pershing. At its own request the American Y. M. C. A. has been relieved from maintaining post exchanges with the Expeditionary forces overseas, the need for such service having been relieved with the signing of the armistice. Correspondence exchanged between General Pershing and E. C. Carter, in charge of the Y. M. C. A. with the army, resulted in this decision. Carter wrote to General Pershing January 29th as follows:

Dear General Pershing: A year and a half ago you requested the Y. M. C. A. to undertake operations for post exchanges for the American Expeditionary Forces in order that "officers and enlisted men may not be taken away for that purpose from their paramount military functions of training and fighting."

As soon as hostilities ceased we raised with you the question whether time had not come for the Y. M. C. A. to be relieved of the operation of post exchanges in view of the fact that there was no longer the same pressing demand on man power of the army for training and fighting. When we first raised the question with you it did not appear to you that it was feasible in the best interests of maximum service to the army that a change be made. Now the situation is materially altered.

Recent general orders from main headquarters and requests from commanding officers have laid on the Y. M. C. A. increased responsibilities in promoting educational, athletic and entertainment activities in the American Expeditionary Force. This is placing a rapidly increasing burden upon our personnel. The army is also now preparing for the delivery of all supplies for post exchanges which heretofore have been imported, manufactured and delivered by the Y. M. C. A.

In view of the changed situation I wish to know whether you do not think it would be possible for the army at a very early date to assume full responsibility for the maintenance of post exchanges throughout the American Expeditionary Force?

General Pershing immediately acted upon the suggestion made by Carter and relieved the Y. M. C. A. of its task of maintaining the post exchanges. He said:

My Dear Mr. Carter: I have received your letter of January 29th asking whether, in view of present changed situation, it would be possible for the army to assume full responsibility for maintenance of post exchanges throughout American Expeditionary Force.

As you correctly state, the Y. M. C. A. undertook the management of post exchanges at my request at a time when it was of greatest importance that no available soldier should be taken away from vital military functions of training and fighting. As reasons which impelled me at that time to request you to undertake this work no longer exist, I am glad to approve your suggestion in reaching this conclusion. Consideration has been given to new burdens in connection with entertainment, athletic activities and education that you have assumed. I have accordingly given directions that army units themselves take over and operate their own post exchanges. In making this change permit me to thank you for the very valuable services and assistance which the Y. M. C. A. has rendered to the American Expeditionary Force in handling these exchanges. Handicapped by shortage of tonnage and land transportation the Y. M. C. A. has, by extra exertion, served the army better than could have been expected, and you may be assured that its aid has been a large factor in the final great accomplishments of the American army.
