LOAN-PAYING DATES FIXED.

Installments on Victory Notes will Run to November 11.

Washington, April 6.—Carter Glass, secretary of the treasury, has announced the dates upon which payments will be required on the notes of the victory loan as follows:

Ten per cent with application on or before May 10. Ten per cent on or before July 15. Twenty per cent on or before August 12. Twenty per cent on or before September 9. Twenty per cent on or before November 11, with accrued interest on deferred installments.

Payments in full can be made on May 2, the 10 per cent required with application having been duly paid on or before May 10. Payment can also be completed on any installment date with accrued interest.

Tank Brigades for Each Army Corps.

Washington, April 7.—Recognition of the importance of armored tanks, ordnance cavalry, in modern warfare is indicated by the peace time organization of this arm, just approved by the war department.

The United States will maintain in commission and ready for service under the plans a minimum of 1050 tanks, 330 being of the heavy and 720 of the light type. A third type, known as the "signal tank", is provided for each company and battalion commandery 45 in all being comprised in the complete tank organization.

A tank brigade, composed of one battalion of heavy tanks and two of light tanks, will be attached to each army corps. The typical heavy battalion includes 45 fighting tanks, with 24 in reserve, and the light battalion 45 fighting machines with 25 in reserve.

95 Miles of Road to be Paved.

Tacoma, April 7.—Ninety-five miles of county roads will be paved if the citizens of Pierce county approve the \$2,500,000 bond issue proposed by the county commissioner. Commissioner James R. C. Farrell said today.

COMMISSION COMING HERE.

Federal Body to Investigate Claims of Chrome Producers.

Washington, April 7.—On reliable authority, it was learned today, that the commission appointed to administer the mineral relief bill passed by the last congress, will go to Oregon in June to investigate the claims of chrome producers in Jackson and Grant counties. It was also learned that no positive decision has been reached to exclude the claims of those who started mining chrome merely on the authority of government placards posted in towns of the chrome producing areas.

The members of the commission are Messrs. Shafroth, Foster, and Meyer. Mr. Shafroth, formerly was a senator from Colorado. Mr. Foster is an ex-member of the house from Illinois.

HUNGARY'S PLAN UTOPIAN.

Population to be Divided Into Classes and Income Guaranteed.

Berlin, April 7.—The Hungarian population will be divided into three classes, according to the Budapest correspondent of the Greuz Reitung. Intellectual workers will be assured a minimum income of \$7200 at the peace time rate of exchange. Merchants and trade and industrial workers will receive \$5000 and workmen and day laborers \$3300.

OUR OWN STATE

Some Recent Happenings In Various Parts of Oregon

Hood River Orchardist is confident of Record Yield.

Hood River, Or., April 8.—J. R. Nunamaker, who has large orchard holdings and is the director of the Apple Growers' association, predicts that the fruit yield this season will eclipse that of any former years. He estimates the yield at better than 1,500,000 boxes. Mr. Nunamaker says he has never seen the orchards here in healthier condition.

Mr. Nunamaker owns the valley's only large cherry orchard, and he says indications are for a normal cherry yield. The Apple Growers' association last year shipped eight carloads of black cherries to Chicago in 16 pound packed boxes and 307,000 pounds of white varieties to canners at The Dalles.

Road Bond Issue Carries.

Moro, Or., April 6.—Sherman county voters yesterday by an overwhelming majority authorized the issuance of bonds to the amount of \$300,000 for the construction of 67 miles of hard surface highway. At 10 o'clock last night nine precincts out of 11 had given 884 votes in favor of the bonds and 18 votes against them. The remaining two precincts were expected to increase the majority for the bonds.

Hard surface highways will be constructed and work on the roads will be started as soon as possible now that the voters have decided in favor of the bond issue. One of the main arteries on which work has been authorized is the John Day highway.

St. Helens Mill to Rise.

St. Helens, Or., April 8.—St. Helens is to have another sawmill. It is to be built on the point of Sauveville island, which is just opposite the city. The mill proper will be built on the Columbia river side of the island, and a loading dock several hundred feet long will be built on the Willamette slough side of the island. The Island Lumber company, with a capital stock of \$50,000, is the concern which will build and operate the mill and loading dock. The mill, which will have a daily cutting capacity of 60,000 feet, will employ 50 men and will cost approximately \$50,000.

Former Army Aviators

Salem, Or., April 8.—Under the impression that Oregon will make use of airplanes in forest patrol work, several young aviators who have had recent training in the United States army have applied to State Forester F. E. Elliott for employment during the coming summer. While the airplane is considered to be the most effective known method for detecting forest fires, there is no probability of its being established immediately in this state.

Clackamas Still Raided.

Oregon City, Or., April 7.—The largest moonshine still ever found in this county was raided Friday by Sheriff Wilson and Deputies Hughes, Munds and Constable Portney. The still was located on the Sunnyside road, about 12 miles from Oregon City. The outfit was in a house on a 10-acre tract of land leased about a month ago to a man named Jenkins and another whose name was not learned. About 100 gallons of mash was found ready to distill and 50 gallons more was in the process of fermentation. Very little liquor was found by the officers.

Coquille to Have New Hotel.

Marshfield, Or., April 8.—Coquille is to have a modern hotel on the site of the old Baker. The ground to be utilized is 200 by 50 feet. The project, which has advanced to the point of drafting plans, will be a stock company enterprise.

EMPHASIZED.

Governor Submits Inscription for State's Column in Liberty Loan Colonnade.

Salem, Or., April 8.—"America has shown the world its duty toward humanity. Oregon continues in the forefront of the fight to make all people free."

This is the inscription submitted by Governor Olcott to be placed on Oregon's column in the colonnade of states which is to be a spectacular feature of the Victory Loan campaign in New York City. The colonnade is to be made up of columns five feet in diameter and 56 feet in height, each dedicated to a state. Governor Olcott was requested to furnish the theme for the Oregon column. Each state is limited to 25 words in its inscription.

Sydney Stricken by Flu.

Vancouver, B. C., April 7.—Hundreds of new cases of influenza are being reported at Sydney, N. S. W., according to a special cable received here today by the Vancouver World. Ninety deaths occurred last week. "The government has closed schools, theaters, picture, places and race courses," the cable said. Hotel customers are allowed to remain only five minutes on the premises. Masking regulations have been extended and meetings are prohibited.

Chenahis Shows Big Growth.

Chenahis, Wash., April 7.—Owing to the large increase in business at the Chenahis post office and the growth of the city, it has been found necessary to add a fourth regular mail carrier to the force employed here. Audley Wilson, who has been carrying Robert W. Meyers has been named as temporary clerk in the office. Hereafter, the mail carriers on route 7 and 13 will serve Chenahis portion of the city instead of city carrier covering that section.

Five-Day Week is Goal.

Seattle, Wash., April 6.—It was officially announced last night by Frank W. Cotterill, secretary of the Building Trades council, that virtually every local union of the council has voted in favor of a five-day week to take effect in the building industry when new agreements are presented May 1. Many employers, according to Mr. Cotterill, are in favor of this move, both to help relieve unemployment and to aid greater efficiency in the industry.

Wilson Ship will Sail 3 Days Early.

Washington, April 8.—In announcing today that the presidential transport George Washington would sail from New York for Brest Friday instead of next Monday, the date originally fixed for her departure, Assistant Secretary Roosevelt disclosed that the change had been made as the result of a cablegram yesterday from Admiral Edson at Paris inquiring when the ship would sail.
