ANOTHER RESIDENT CALLED.

Sam Walsh, Well Known Citizen, Died Wednesday.

Sam Walsh, a well known resident of this city died at his home at 10:45 Wednesday forenoon after an illness of several years duration.

Mr. Walsh was born at Boyd, Wisconsin, October 16, 1863, and spent most of his youth in the middle west. He came to Washington state in 1889, and remained there until 1905, when he moved to Jacksonville, and has resided here until his death. In early manhood he worked in logging camps and was an expert woodsman; later on he engaged in farming and pursued that vocation up to the time of his death.

In 1892 he was married to Miss Ella Roundtree of Boise, Washington, who survives him. He is also survived by three sons and one daughter, Harry, Clyde and Angus, and Alta, all at home in this city.

Mr. Walsh was a member of the I. O. O. F. and Modern Woodmen orders, belonging to the Centralia lodges. Sam, as he was best known to his friends, was a good neighbor, a kind and affectionate husband and father. He leaves a wide circle of friends and acquaintances who sincerely sympathize with the bereaved family.

Funeral is being held to-day (Saturday), the sermon being preached by Rev. Robert A. Hutchinson of Sutherlin, Oregon, interment in the I. O. O. F. section of Jacksonville cemetery.

California will Try to Enforce Dry Law.

Sacramento, Cal., April 15.—Governor W. D. Stephens today signed the Harris prohibition enforcement bill providing machinery for the enforcement in California of national prohibition and defying as intoxicating any beverage containing more than one-half of 1 per cent of alcohol.

Circulation of petitions asking for a referendum vote on the passage of the Harris bill and the action of the legislature in ratifying the national prohibition amendment will begin in California April 26, Assemblyman Bismark Bruck announced today. He said the referendum movement would be led by the California Grape Protecting association.

Tractor Capsizes on Farm, Killing Driver.

Woodburn, Or., April 15.—Dan Hurt, who was driving a tractor for F. J. Kims, on the Mrs. John Johnston place west of Woodburn, was instantly killed this morning when the tractor ran into a ditch and turned over, crushing him to death. He was endeavoring, with chains, to get the tractor out of the ditch when the fatal accident occurred. He leaves a widow.

Villa Forces Give Battle.

El Paso, Texas, April 14.—A mining man who arrived here yesterday from Chihuahua City said reports were received there of a fight at Santa Rosalia, 90 miles from the state capital, Monday, between government troops and Francisco Villa's main force, with Villa in personal command and General Felipe Angeles second in command.

The Villa followers were driven from the town Monday morning, according to these reports, he said, and the fighting was reported to have been in progress when he left for the border.

Educational Tests.

Standard educational efficiency tests are being given in every school in Jackson County in the subjects of reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling, language, algebra and also a reasoning test. The University of Oregon will assist in compiling data and publish the result in bulletin form to be sent back to all schools. The plan will enable school officers and teachers to compare the work being done in our schools with that being done in other schools. The tests will be watched with considerable interest as the work progresses.
