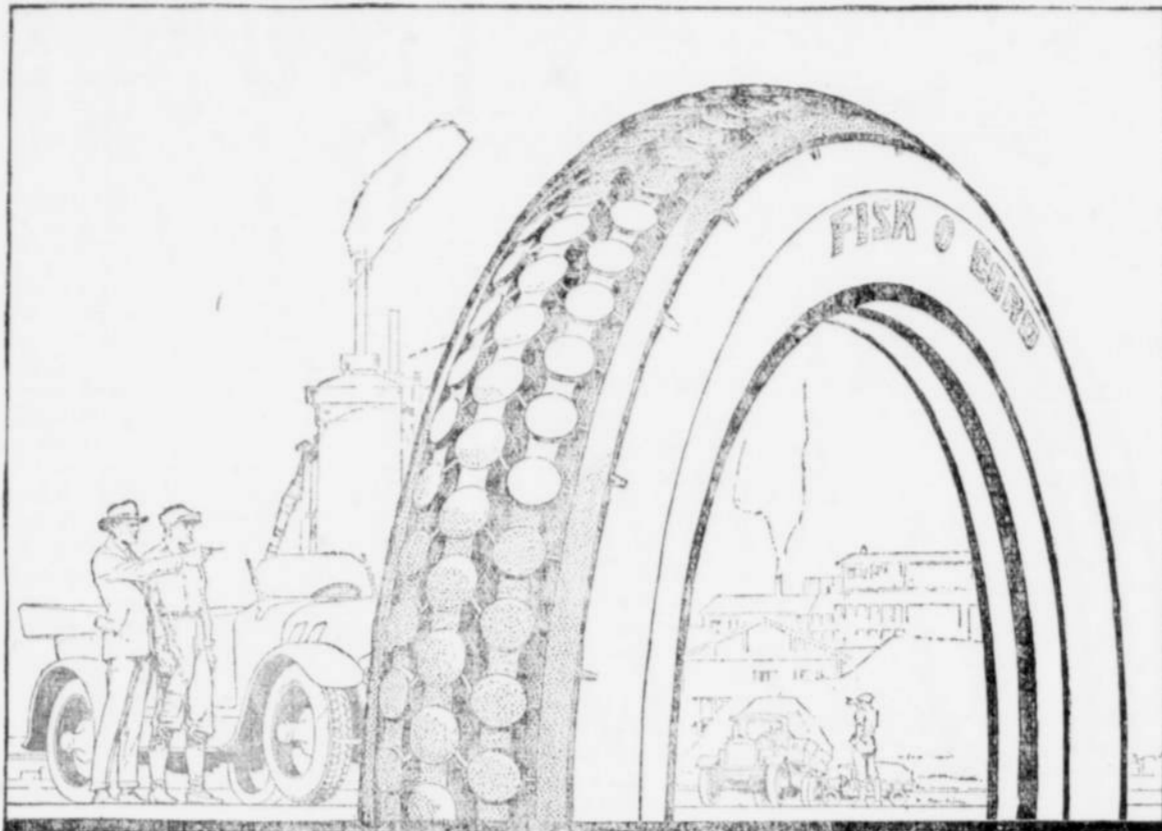

- Two large cups sugar.
- One cup molasses.
- Two cups milk.
- One cup strong black coffee.
- Three heaping teaspoonfuls cinnamon
- One heaping teaspoonful cloves.
- One teaspoonful salt.
- One teaspoonful baking soda.
- Four teaspoonfuls baking powder.
- Two large cups raisins (the shrapnel)
- Flour to make a stiff batter.
